#### Obituary.

Diebold Willm, Sr., was born on the 26th of February, 1855. Boden, Germany, was his birthplace and there he spent the days of his childhood and youth. He was baptized and confirmed in the Lutheran church of his community, and there received his schooling. In common with the youth of his day, he spent three years with the armed forces of his country, serving in the artillery division.

In March of 1881, he journeyed to America, returning to his native land in August of the same year. One year later, in August of 1882, he returned to America and made his home in Paris, Illinois, living with an aunt and uncle. On this second journey to America he was accompanied by other relatives and friends, one of whom became his wife. Thus on the 26th of June, 1883 he was united in marriage to Miss Magdalena Yundt in Paris, Ill. After a brief residence in that community, they moved to Eagle, Nebraska, and resided in this community ever since.

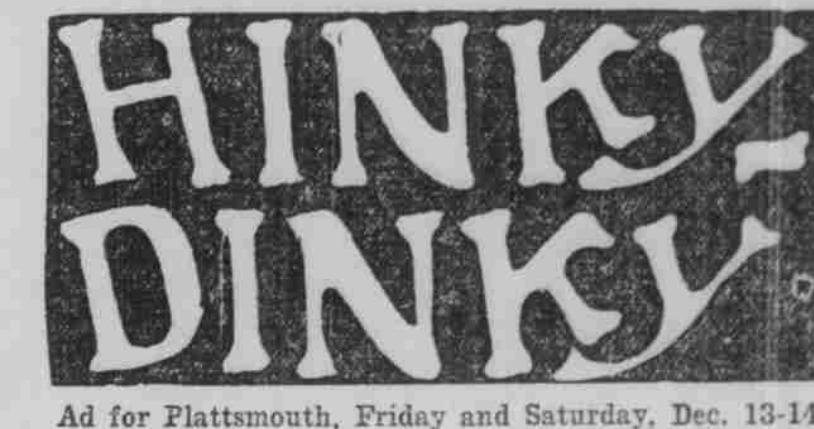
#### ANTI-JEWISH RIOTS
