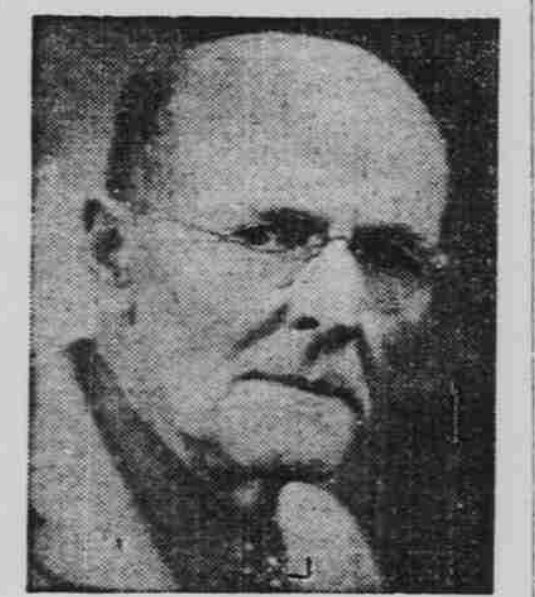
Anniversary of Rotary Club is Observed
