MRS. FRANK BAKER SPEAKS

Grand Island.—Delegates to the thirty-fourth annual convention of the Nebraska Daughters of the American Revolution heard Mrs. Frank W. Baker of Omaha, state regent, deliver the principal address at their meeting here Wednesday.

Mrs. J. C. Aainscow of Omaha read a set of resolutions at the opening meeting during the afternoon. The resolutions, which were adopted by the forty-fourth continental congress of the D. A. R., include:

- Support of the Dies, Green, and Taylor bills providing for reduced immigration quotas;
- Call on congress to pass appropriation bills requisite for the construction and replacement of old ships, and to pass an army appropriation bill calling for increased enlistments in the standing army;
- Endorsement of the merchant marine, privately owned and operated, built in the United States, and manned by American citizens;
- Endorsement of the R. O. T. C., and the require oath of allegiance by teachers paid from public funds;
- Registration of all aliens;
- Denial of benefits of the D. A. R. student loan fund to students who pledge themselves never to defend their country.
- Compulsory teaching of American history, civics, and government in all high schools;
- Display of the American flag on all federal buildings.

FRICKE HEADS POWER WORK

Kearney, Neb.—Charles B. Fricke of Columbus, president of the Loup River public power district, Wednesday afternoon was elected chairman of the advisory committee of Nebraska's three largest federally financed power projects. Other officers were not named.

By-laws and plans for selling power of the three projects were discussed during the afternoon, but Fricke said the organization meeting will be continued in the morning.

The committee is expected to adopt a site for permanent offices and make definite arrangements for co-ordinating the power phases of the three projects—Loup, Central Nebraska and Platte Valley.

Members of the board are: K. Sewell Wingfield, assistant chief of PWA's power division; P. F. Hopkins, PWA engineer of Des Moines; George Johnson of Hastings, general manager of the Tri-County; Clarence H. Fischer of Ogallala, Platte Valley representative, and Fricke.

OPERATION ENDS SNEEZING

Omaha.—An operation in an Omaha hospital Friday ended a six weeks sneezing spell suffered by Verna May McLaughlin of Cumming Center, Neb., north of Blair. Verna May was brought to the hospital by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Harry McLaughlin, farmers. They said that for the past six weeks she had sneezed almost continually, except when out of doors.

When treatments by doctors in the vicinity of the McLaughlin home failed, Verna May was brought to an Omaha specialist, who said the sneezing was due to a growth of mucous membrane in the nose, in the area of the middle turbinates and septum, and the contact of the membrane caused a tickling sensation. An operation corrected the trouble Friday. Verna May is expected to leave the hospital in a few days and return to school. She has been out of school for more than five weeks.

RESUME RIVER WORK

Blair, Neb.—Missouri river improvement work is expected to be resumed Thursday on Seebold bend, three miles east of the Blair bridge. A million-dollar project is being carried out on the bend, designed to force the stream to dig a deeper and narrower channel instead of eating away valuable farm land. Another project of similar size is to reopen soon at DeSoto bend, southeast of Blair.
