

Apply Lime with Caution

It Can Often Do More Harm Than Good to Lawns—Purpose Is to Neutralize Acid Soils.

Lime may be unnecessary or actually harmful to lawns. This does not mean that it should never be used, because there are cases where it is needed, but lime must be used intelligently.

The function of lime is to correct or neutralize acid soils when they are to be used in growing plants which do best in a neutral or alkaline soil. It is necessary, therefore, that you know the condition of your soil as well as the preference of the plants you are going to grow in it before lime can be intelligently used. Many dealers in lawn and garden supplies will test soil for acidity free of charge. Inexpensive testing kits will enable you to do your own testing.

Many grasses do best on soil that is slightly acid. You'll appreciate the importance of this when you know that an acid condition is unfavorable to the growth of weeds.

Contrary to general belief, moss is not necessarily a sign of acid soil. It is rather a sign that present conditions are not favorable to the growth of grass. Lack of available plant food in the soil is often indicated by the growth of moss.

The impression that lime is a suitable substitute for plant food should be corrected. Even though a soil test shows that because your lawn is too strongly acid it is desirable to apply lime, a well balanced plant food is needed. An application right now of 4 pounds of complete plant food per 100 square feet, applied evenly, is necessary to make your lawn a thing of real beauty, and velvety green.

PUNISHED FOR NON-VOTING

Berlin.—Nazi punishment was visited upon industrial workers who failed to vote in the March 29 reichstag elections, it was disclosed. They were summarily dismissed from their jobs. The German labor front, together with the Nazi party organization, prevailed upon the employers to fire such "slackers," contending the fellow workers who "did their duty" could not tolerate the existence of the others in their midst. One known case was that of a man who had held a job with the same concern for ten years.

The reichstag election was considered by the Nazis as a plebiscite upon Reichstuehrer Hitler's foreign policy. Dr. Hugo Eckener, noted zeppelin commander, was among those reported to have fallen into official disfavor because he did not vote.

REBUILDING OMAHA STREET

Omaha.—Reconstruction of 13th st. from Howard in the downtown district to Missouri ave. in South Omaha at a cost estimated by city and works progress administration officials of almost 1 million dollars is scheduled to get under way here this week.

The project, covering a distance of three and one-half miles and described by the officials as the WPA's most ambitious undertaking here to date, calls for widening and repaving of the street into a four lane highway with parallel parking lanes on either side. When complete, they said, the street will be even wider than the new Dodge thoroughfare. Installation of a new storm sewer over almost the entire length of the project is included in the plans.
