ROTC College Groups Arrive at Fort Crook

Encampment Roster Lists 223 for Annual Six Weeks Training Period; Pitch Tents.

Army khaki and the Stars and Stripes replaced college colors as 223 advanced military students of University of Nebraska, University of South Dakota and Creighton university settled Monday into the first full day of their annual six-week reserve officer training camp at Fort Crook.

With a quadrangle of military field tents for dormitories and a sun-baked parade ground for laboratory, the collegians lost no time in developing a first class case of sunburn, tired feet and a first-hand knowledge of the army life studied in the past three years in campus classes.

All day Sunday the students rolled into camp by train, automobile and some on foot. Reporting to regular army instructors, they were hustled through physical examinations, issued army summer uniforms and guns were assigned to barracks.

Ten late arrivals, including two Nebraska football stars, Lloyd Cardwell and Sam Francis, did not report until Monday.

On their first field maneuver, the entire camp was marched Monday morning to observe attack and combat tactics over rough ground north-east of the main post. Only the kitchen police detail and headquarters orderlies, duties rotated during the camp period, remained behind.

They were a perspiring, panting line of troops before the exercise was completed, too. But unlike the raw recruits of civilian military training camps, the R. O. T. C. students fell in with a military precision from the first assembly to demonstrate the basic training of their college drill classes.

Students completing the camp and taking one more year of college military work will receive commissions as reserve officers next year.
