MOTOR GROUP COMMENDED

Detroit.—The American Automobile association opened its annual convention here with a message from President Roosevelt, who commended the motoring group for its help "in making new drivers in the years ahead more proficient and more responsible."

Thomas P. Henry of Detroit, AAA president, advocated an eight point legislative program, which he termed a "bill of rights to assure full and free use of the automobile with the maximum of safety and the maximum of economy."

The proposed legislation which Henry Ford urged the 300 delegates to submit to state legislatures and the national congress, called for:

- "Roads suitable for the needs of modern motor traffic, fair budgeting of road costs, free passage at state borders, proper sanitation and decent appearance along the roadside, opposition to federal and local encroachment in the motor tax field, proper distribution of motor tax revenue among various local jurisdictions, stopping of diversion and setting up of official 'safety authorities' each of the states."

Cass county has no bonded indebtedness, as, like the state, it has paid cash for its gravel roads and other improvements. That's a mighty good policy to pursue.

MEDICAL NOTES

Remains of the world's largest insect, a dragonfly which lived 150,000,000 years ago, has been found as a fossil near Elmo, Kansas, by Dr. Frank M. Carpenter, of Harvard. The insect measured nearly two and a half feet long.

Insurance companies consider overweight a serious disability. The most common causes of overweight are too much food and too little exercise. Nostrums for reduction of weight are usually dangerous.

There are many kinds of "rheumatism." The main varieties are inflammatory or rheumatic fever, the chronic condition known as arthritis, and muscular rheumatism. Rheumatic fever is an infectious disease more commonly found in children and young people. It is rarely fatal, but quite serious because the germ causing it may attack the heart. Arthritis make the joints stiff, swollen and deformed. It seldom kills people, but if not checked, causes great suffering and interference with work. Muscular rheumatism usually yields to rest, heat and massage, but chronic cases may refuse to yield until the cause is discovered and removed.

Hearts of animals, transplanted to other animals, have kept on beating for three months or more, according to a report rendered the Zoological Society of America by Drs. W. H. Wright and H. Collins, of the University of Pittsburgh.

Last year the common cold cost more than \$5,000,000 in loss of wages. More absences from work were due to it than any other illness. When you have a cold, stay at home, and if it is severe, remember pneumonia is a possible danger.

Until Dr. Theobald Smith discovered the cause of Texas cattle fever in 1888, the annual loss from this disease was \$40,000,000 per year.

The increasing number of cases of trench mouth is attributed to uncleanliness in glasses used in taverns and eating establishments serving alcoholic beverages by Dr. Don C. Lyons, of Jackson, Michigan.

Humanity has grown two inches in average height during the last century, according to Dr. Edith Boyd, of the Minnesota University Department of Anatomy.

More injuries in athletic sports occur to the knee than to any other place in the body, according to Dr. Marcus H. Hobart of Northwestern University.

Diabetes is increasing. Early diagnosis with proper treatment following enables the patient to live a useful life. Most diabetics are fat, though of course, not every fat person gets diabetes.

NO FEAR OF SECURITY ACT

Omaha.—Leroy A. Lincoln, president of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company of New York, said here he foresees continued business improvement, and does not expect the social security act to have a damaging effect on life insurance.

"I see nothing at cross purposes between the social security act and life insurance," he said. "It is my opinion that those business institutions having their own old age retirement plans will adjust them to conform to the government's new program, and no employe will lose as a result." He was in Omaha presiding at a meeting of 300 Nebraska and Iowa managers, assistant managers and agents.
