This mileage, November _____\$ 68.20 brought production in 1936 to 46,-919,362 tons, 40 percent more than 1935, and the fourth consenttive year of improvement and third largest total in the history of the industry. The 1936 output was exceeded only in 1228 and 1929. Operations increased to 68 52 percent of capacity in 1935 from 48.54 in 1934.
