To apply for either hospitalization or domicialiary care for veterans, Veterans' Administration Form P-10 is used. This form can be obtained from the service officer of your post of the American Legion, or from the closest Veterans Administration Facility or Hospital (Veterans' Hospital at Lincoln, in this area).

Free hospital treatment, including transportation to and from the Veterans Administration Facilities, and an attendant, if necessary, is provided honorably discharged veterans of any war. Provision is also made for peacetime ex-service men having a service connected disability.

There is an established preference for admission, as follows:

(a) War veterans (including draftees who draw pension) with service connected disability and need of treatment therefor,

(b) Peacetime ex-service men with service connected disability and need of treatment therefor.
