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Prison Expert Says State Reformatories Lacking

Lack of Proper Surroundings and Proper Management in Many of State Institutions.

"By firm control and careful, unbiased administration, this can be made one of the outstanding prisons in the United States," stated John R. Cranor, penal expert, in the summary of the state penitentiary for the survey of social resources. Mr. Cranor made his survey of the penitentiary and the reformatory several months ago, but it was not released for publication until Thursday. This section of the survey, the final section to be released, is concerned with the adult offender and covers the state penitentiary, reformatory for men, women's reformatory and county jails of Nebraska. Mr. Cranor was formerly superintendent of the noted reformatory for men at Huntington, Pa.

According to the survey, the reformatory was created for the purpose of preventing young first offenders from becoming criminals. The act creating the reformatory in 1921 provided for commitment of "first offenders convicted of a felony, who are between the ages of 16 and 30," and indeterminate sentences for the purpose of "confinement, discipline and instruction." In summary the report states, "the failure to comply with the purposes of the act of 1921 makes the reformatory a depressing place. The only mandate of law which is being carried out is that of confinement."

In the discussion in the study of the York reformatory for women, Mr. Cranor's report is summarized by the following statement: "In the last analysis, one can only say that York is not the type of institution Nebraska thought it was building. It is strictly custodial, completely repressive, is not clean, and has no redeeming features. Nebraska built some buildings and sentenced some girls to a reformatory, but it has yet to build its institution."

Mrs. Maude E. Nuquist, newly appointed board of control member, announced that staff changes are being made at the women's reformatory at York to correct "faults reports by John R. Cranor, penal expert, in a survey of state institutions. Mrs. Nuquist, who takes office July 1, made her statement coincident with the release for publication of Cranor's sweeping charges. His investigation was conducted as a part of a survey of Nebraska's social resources under Miss Phyllis Osborn.

"The general impression is that of forlorn austerity," Cranor wrote of the York institution. "The personnel has kept pace with the salary schedule—both are low." Cranor commented there were two babies counted as inmates at the time of his study and added, "There is no evidence of any attempt to furnish vocational training," contrary to the law.

The survey reports that comments on the fee system for feeding prisoners is a vicious one. The reason given is that everything above actual food cost may be converted into profit. Sheriffs are allowed 75 cents per day for boarding prisoners in jails, with an average of less than 50 prisoners per day. The day's menu given as example for one jail visited was: Coffee, corn flakes and milk for breakfast; boiled potatoes, bread and butter and coffee for dinner; and for the evening meal, prunes and dried corn. The survey committee recommends abolition of the fee system for county jails.

Many county jails are insanitary and prisoners are kept in idleness. "Idleness provides further schooling or immorality and crime." The survey suggests "that there be established a system of state penal farms which would offer opportunity for productive labor, training and life in the open. Informed persons have also said that certain of the camps used during the recent transient program would, with little cost to the state, be made available for such a purpose. A proper use of the probation system would also reduce the need for the county jail as a place of punishment.

WINTERSTEEN WINS BANNER. Wintersteen school was awarded the library banner for reading Monday. This is the first time the banner has gone to the school. It is awarded each half quarter to the school which first completes the required reading at the public library. Miss Garnet Clare is teacher.

16,000,000 FLAT FEET IN U. S.

Nine out of ten persons after fifty years of age have foot defects today, 65 per cent of the boys and 80 per cent of the girls in schools have foot ills and there are nearly 8,000,000 sufferers from flat feet. The Literary Digest states in a study of foot troubles.

There are now \$50 corrective or health shoes and from the old-time corals, calluses, bunions and ingrown nails, the magazine finds, the number of foot maladies has jumped to seventy-three. Attending to these ills there are now 8,000 chiropodists and podiatrists in the nation.

Corus rank next to athlete's foot as the most prevalent foot worry. But despite quacks' assertions to the contrary these growths have no roots, the magazine states, and are simply built-up layers of calloused skin-tissue.
