From the audience spoke up a gray bearded listener. "Say, looky here, Kurnel," he said. "I was in that there fight myself and what really happened wuz that them plugged Yanks give us a fast rate lickin', and run us ten miles across country. With a magnificent gesture of surrender the Colonel rose to his feet. "Gentlemen," he said, "another instance of a good story spoiled by a damn eyewitness!"
