

A. G. Johnson Dies Early Today at Hospital

Long Time Resident Here Has Been Ill for Past Six Weeks; Taken to Hospital Monday.

A. G. Johnson, 71, a resident of Plattsmouth for many years, died this morning at 4 o'clock at the Clarkson hospital at Omaha, following an illness that has covered the past six weeks. Mr. Johnson has been a sufferer from heart trouble as well as asthma and in the last weeks his condition has been very serious and Monday he was taken to the Omaha hospital for treatment.

Mr. Johnson is one of the veterans of the Burlington, being engaged in the local shops of the Burlington over a long period of years, and later was employed in the BREX shops until his retirement from active service.

He was a member of Plattsmouth lodge No. 6, A. F. & A. M. and also of Mt. Zion commandery No. 5, Knights Templar.

In the past nine years Mr. Johnson has made his home with his daughter, Miss Helen on the farm in East Rock Bluff precinct, since his retirement devoting his time to farming.

He is survived by the daughter, Helen and one son, Melvin, of Chicago, the wife preceding him in death several years ago.
