A FEW months before his death Gen. Basil of Kentucky, who commanded Morgan's Cavalry after the killing of his brother-in-law, Gen. John Morgan, told this tale at a Confederate reunion in his home city of Louisville:

He was a green recruit. His horse had run away with him-the bit had broken and white as a sheet and scared stiff, the luckless youth was being propelled straight at the whooping Kentuckians, begging for mercy as he came. Jeff Sterritt, a noted wit of the command, stopped the horse and

made a willing prisoner of the rider. Sterritt, who had not washed or shaved for days and was a ferocious looking person, pulled out a big pistol and wagged its muzzle in the terrified Federal's face. "I don't know whether to kill you right now," he said, "or wait until the fight is over!" "Mister," begged the quivering captive, "as a favor to me, please
