Plans Made for C M T C for the Coming Summer

Will Be Held This Year in July Instead of August—Great Interest Shown.

Omaha, March 31.—The Citizens' Military Training camp at Fort Crook, Nebraska, for young men who live in Nebraska will be held a month earlier than usual this year, according to an announcement made by Major General Stanley H. Ford, commanding the Seventh Corps Area. The camp has been held in August in the past but this year it will open July 24 and close July 31st.

Holding this camp in July will cause it to run concurrently with the Reserve Officers Training Corps camp at Fort Crook, states General Ford, and it is expected that keen competition will result in all activities of the camp, including parades, rifle marksmanship, and athletics, especially track events and boxing, one of the boys who participated in the boxing at Fort Crook last year entered the Golden Gloves tournament last winter, and General Ford believes that the new competition will develop many more stars.

The camp at Fort Crook is open for Nebraska boys between the ages of 17 and 24 who are of good moral character and can pass the required physical examination. All necessary expenses are paid by the government, including transportation to and from camp and meals en route, and food, uniforms, athletic equipment, laundry service, and medical attention are furnished at camp.

More than half of the quota of 600 application for Nebraska has already been filled, according to General Ford, and many applications are being received daily, but young men who apply at once and complete their applications without delay still have a chance to be accepted.

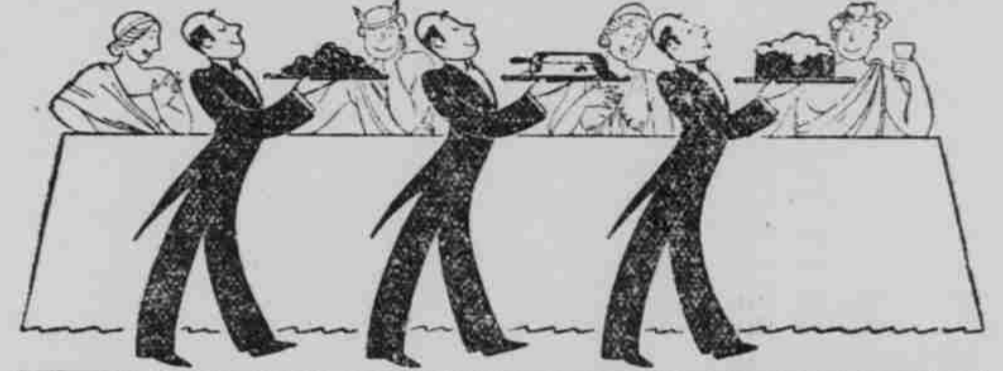

CHOCOLATE-FOOD OF THE GODS

A fanciful description you think? But it's the literal translation of the name given by a great naturalist to the cacao tree, which produces chocolate beans.

What a help to you homemakers of modern cooking chocolate is— with each one-ounce square neatly divided for instant use! And what a gay deceiver is that rich, smooth chocolate flavor with its power to hide, gracefully, the economies of simple dishes and transform them into apparent extravagances!

Here are some familiar favorites over which chocolate weaves its magic spell—to the joy of any family:

- Chocolate Macaroons**
- 2 egg whites
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 1/2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 1 1/2 cups shredded coconut
- Beat egg whites until foamy throughout; add sugar, 2 tablespoons at a time, beating after each addition until sugar is blended. Then continue beating until mixture will stand in peaks. Add salt and vanilla. Fold in chocolate; then coconut. Drop from teaspoon on ungreased heavy paper. Bake in slow oven (325 degrees F.) 20 minutes, or until done. Cool 5 minutes before removing from paper. Makes 2 dozen 1 1/2 inch macaroons.
- Chocolate Dessert Waffles**
- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 egg yolks, well beaten
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup melted butter
- 2 squares unsweetened chocolate, melted
- 1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 egg whites, stiffly beaten
- Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and sugar, and sift together three times. Add butter. Combine egg, milk, and vanilla; add to flour mixture, stirring until all flour is dampened. Add chocolate and blend; then beat vigorously 1 minute.
- Melt 3 tablespoons butter in 8x8x2-inch pan over low flame; add sugar and cook and stir until thoroughly mixed. On this arrange wedges of pineapple, or cover mixture with grated pineapple. Turn batter out on contents of pan. Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 50 minutes, or until done. Loosen cake from sides pan with spatula. Turn upside down on dish with pineapple on top. Garnish with whipped cream, if desired. Serve warm.
- Chocolate Pineapple Upside Down Cake** may be made with 1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, instead of 1/2 cup white sugar, in butter-sugar mixture in pan.
