W. W. Wilson Named as New District Judge

Former Supreme Court Commissioner of Nebraska City Receives Appointment Friday.

Governor R. L. Cochran Friday evening at Lincoln announced that he had made the appointment of W. W. Wilson of Nebraska City as judge of the second judicial district, succeeding the late Judge W. G. Kieck. Judge Wilson is well known in the district as he has been one of the prominent members of the Otoe county bar and has previously been suggested for the judgeship.

The new judge was born in Otoe county and has made his home there

for his lifetime. He graduated from the University of Nebraska college of law and while a student there was an associate of former Governor Arthur J. Weaver and the late George H. Dern, former secretary of war.

Judge Wilson commenced the active practice of law at Nebraska City in 1896 and has been very prominent in the profession since that time. He has served as city attorney of Nebraska City for five years, was the county attorney of Otoe county for four years and served as county judge of that county over a six year period.

Judge Wilson served three terms as a member of the Nebraska supreme court commission, being first selected in 1925 and again in 1927 and 1929, or until the commission was abolished by law.

The new judge comes to the bench with these years of experience as a jurist that should enable him to give the people of the district a very efficient service on the bench.

Since his retirement from the supreme court commission Judge Wilson has been engaged in private practice and is at the present time the attorney for the Home Owners Loan corporation, one of the new governmental departments.

Gayer of Plattsmouth and Mrs. Hiltner of Lincoln and seven grandchildren, John, Billy, Mary and Betty Gayer of Plattsmouth and Robert, John Henry, and Rosemary Hiltner of Lincoln. One sister also sur-

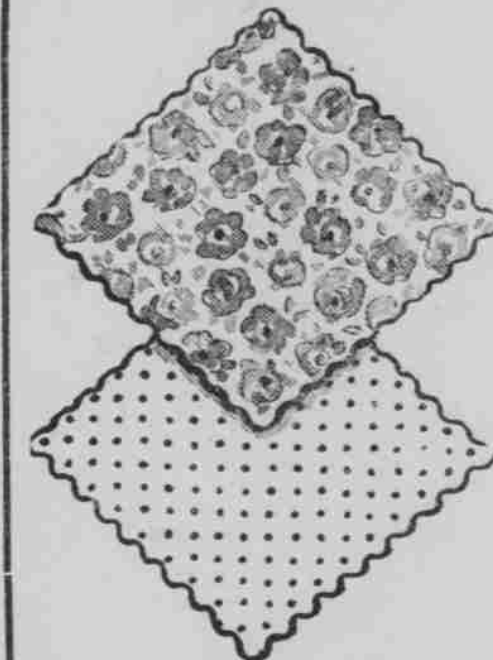

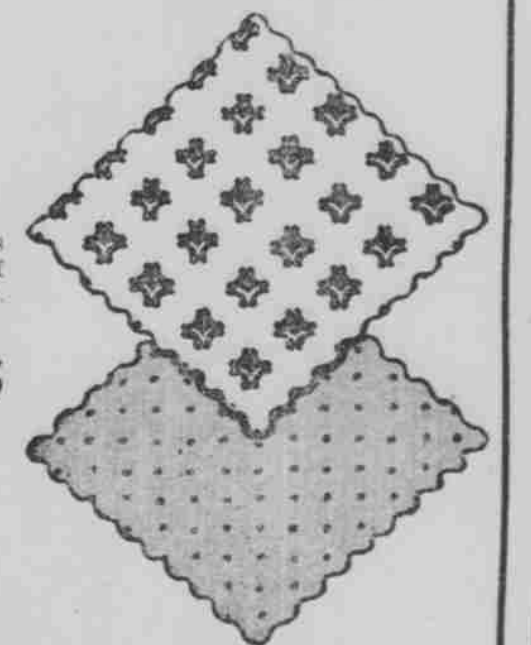

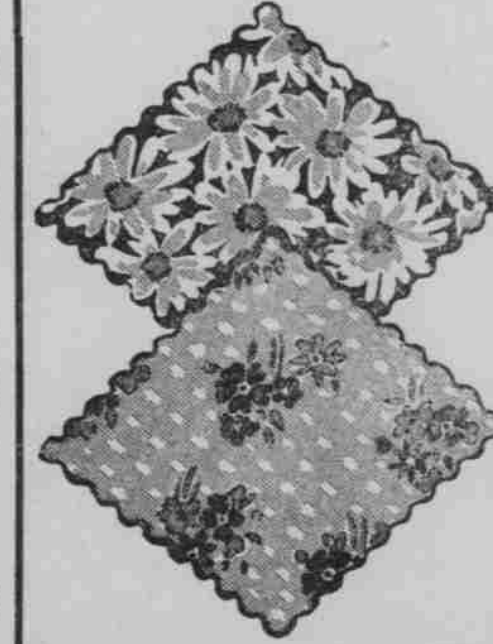
