Harry S. Byrne, of Omaha, secretary of the Nebraska Good Roads association and Hale R. Bixby of Lincoln, a field worker of the organization were in the city Tuesday to interview a number of the residents on the local co-operation in the association program.

The Good Roads association is active in assisting in various counties in getting their programs arranged and seeing that the goods roads funds are divided as the counties and cities pay in their funds to the state in the form of gasoline taxes and which aids in matching the federal aid.

The Cass county people contribute a large sum to be used in the roads program and it was to the interest of the community in the road problems that the representatives of the association were here.

While the good roads problem is being discussed the residents of the county and of northern Otoe county are still traveling the stretch of gravel in the paved highway 24, covering the section from near Elmwood to west of Nehawka. This stretch of highway should be paved this year and complete a much needed project and a part of the federal Highway No. 44 to Lincoln and the west.

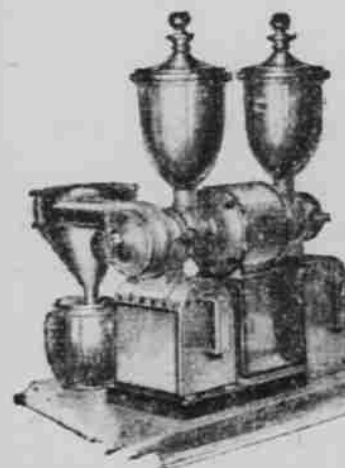

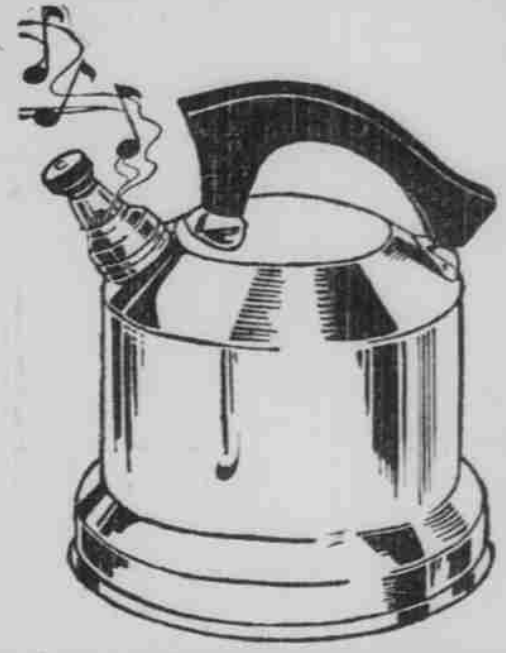
