Chicago.-The highest prices for eorn in 17 years and for rye in 9 years were posted on the board of trade blackboards at the exciting climax of a market "squeeze." Traders seldom in recent years have witnessed such fireworks in the closing out of contracts. This was the final day for trading in opinions specifying delivery of commodities in May.

May corn soared more than 5 cents to \$1.00 a bushel; May rye 7 1-2e to \$1,33 1-2; May oats almost 5c to 56 1-4 and May soy beans 4 1-2c to \$1.76 1-2. May wheat, in striking contrast, dropped 4 1-8c closing at \$1.20 as holders rushed to sell before premiums for old crop wheat were wiped off the board.
