Selections are made from the most qualified applicants. Quarterly enas are needed to fill camp vacancies.

Physical fitness is important and preliminary examinations are given to all men to make sure that no conditions exist which would make it inadvisable for any man to accept vigorous outdoor employment, and to guard against communicable diseases of all kinds.

If a man becomes ill or has an accident while he is in camp or on the job, he will receive free medical care and hospitalization if needed. In case of accident while in line of duty, enrollees will come under the United States compensation law.
