State of Sonora Hopes to Open Country for Tourists-Montains Are an Obstacle.

HERMOSILO, Sonora, Mex., July 11. (UP)-Visions of another worldfamous bordertown comparable to Aqua Callente are seen for this small west coast Mexican town following award of a 7,000,000-peso contract for paving a highway from here to the Sinaloa state line.

The contract is halled by American and Mexican authorities as the first and most important step in the long visualized first-class highways from the international border at Nogales to Mexico City.

State tourist bureaus anticipate a 1,000 per cent increase in trade, and already sites have been chosen for two modern hotels.

Gov. Roman Yocupicio was hailed as responsible for the inauguration of the highway, and business men recall his inaugural address last September when he pledged highway improvement as one of the vital aims of his administration.

Hopes to Advance Friendship

To build a greater American tourist trade and foster a deeper feeling of friendship between the two countries, Yocupicio founded a state tourist bureau shortly after he took office.

Today tourist bureaus are in every important city in Sonora.



1939 NEW YORK FAIR'S TWO MILE AMUSEMENT LOOP



NEW YORK (Special.)-"The 1939 New York World's Fair has planned to have the largest area and the greatest number and variety of amusements ever provided for any exposition in the world," announces Grover Whalen, President of the Fair Corporation, "but let it be understood, too, that we are already assured of producing a fair that will be remembered for its bold treatment of today's problems and for its pathfinding to the World of Tomorrow."

The accompanying photograph shows the design of the Fair's twomile, 280-acre amusement zone as released at the time of Mr. Whalen's announcement. The sector is being laid out with a greater visitor capacity spectacle, device, ride, and eating place,

than that of any amusement park in the world. Following an entirely new pattern that lends itself to the development of new and novel amusement and entertainment features, the sector is featured by the two-mile looped thoroughfare, flanked on one side by a continuous facade 70 feet high and on the other by the more open and landscaped area extending to the east shore of Meadow Lake

The upper end of the lake-shore region will be dominated by a \$1,600,000 State amphitheatre with a marine stage for presentation of aquatic shows, operas, pageants and extravaganzes of all sorts. On the far side of the lake, as sketched, will be every conceivable kind of show,


