


### Laughing Around the World With IRVIN S. COBB

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## Report Loss of Corn from Dry and Heat

Western Two-thirds of State Shows Considerable Damage to the New Crop.

Crops suffered further damage during the month of July. Rainfall. was spotted and generally lacking in most of the western two-thirds of the state. High temperatures occurring during the 4th and 5th of July caused further damage to spring grains in northern panhandle counties, Soilmoisture conditions were generally invorable for corn on the first of July but by the 10th of July, some areas were badly in need of rain. This con dition continued generally through out the balance of the month to the by August I corn was firing and showing considerable damage in area in the western two-thirds of the stat. Fince August 1, high temperatures, hot winds and lack of rainfall have continued to lower the condition of corn. Corn is now firing in some eastern counties. The percentage of barren stalks in these areas is noticeably larger than usual.

Winter wheat production improved ver the estimate for July 1 due prininally to better than expected yields in Platte river counties which were heavily inferred by bin k stem rust On the other hand, there was considerably more heat damage to winter wheat in south central and central Nebraeka than expected. Generally barley, oats and spring wheat have been seriously damaged by high temperatures occurring in the latter part of June and the first week in July Crop damage from grasshoppers is generally spotted. Small grain fields and alfalfa have been injured by of alfalfa was generally short except.
