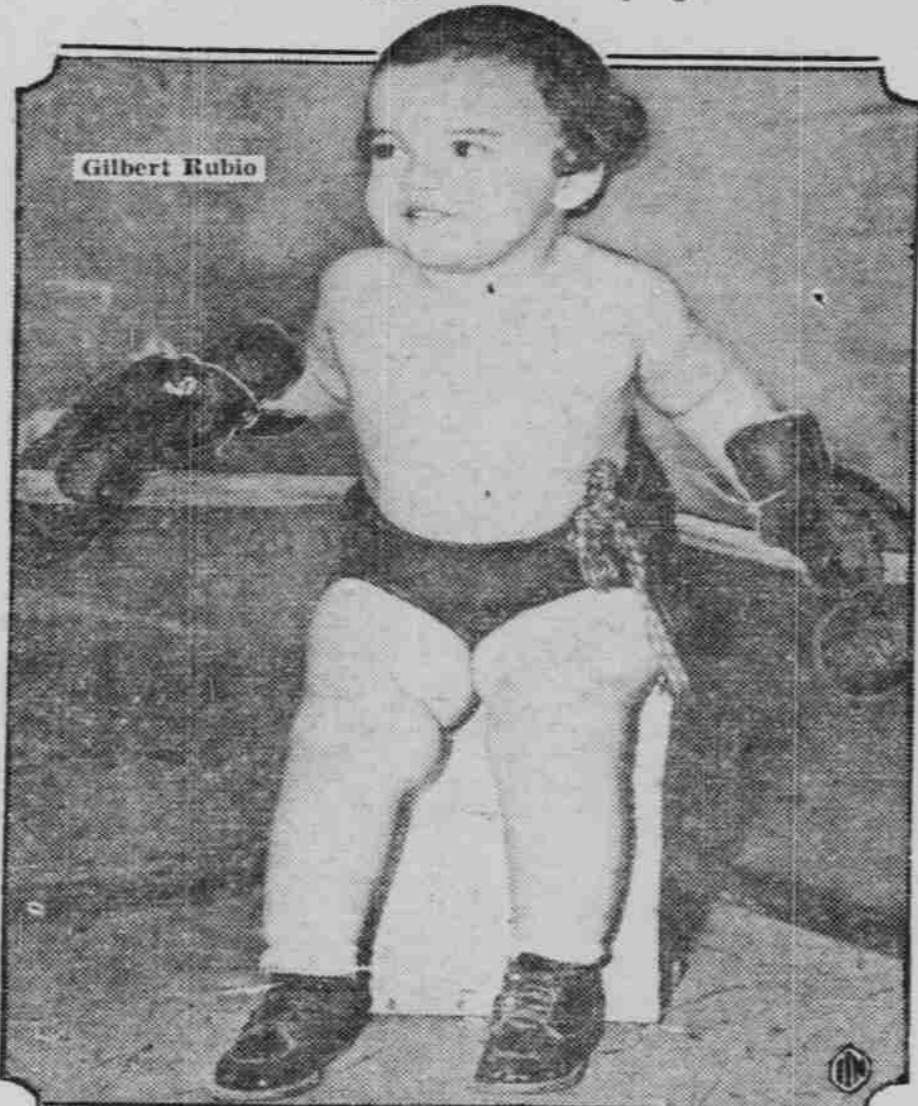

PUBLIC LIBRARY NOTES

The report of the Plattsmouth public library for September shows that 2642 books were exchanged. The increase over August was 536 books and the decrease over September 1936 was 314. 67 new borrowers were added and 13 new books were purchased.
