### ASKS \$35,000 DAMAGES

 In the office of the clerk of the district court today an action was filed by Dick Baker, special administrator of the estate of Verna Baker, deceased, against Al Fleming, James R. Mentzer, Theodore Mentzer and Mentzer Brothers, a corporation.

The administrator asks damages in the sum of \$35,000 against the defendants for the death of Mrs. Verna Baker, wife of the plaintiff.

The petition sets forth that on Friday, October 1st, the plaintiff with his wife, Verna, and infant son, Ronald, were riding in an auto driven by the plaintiff, that as their car entered highway No. 75 it was struck by a truck driven by the defendant Fleming and belonging to the Mentzer Brothers. As the result of the crash the infant was killed and Mrs. Baker so severely injured that she died a short time later.

It was Francis M. Hetherington, prominent Nebraska Young Democrat chairman, who was seated next

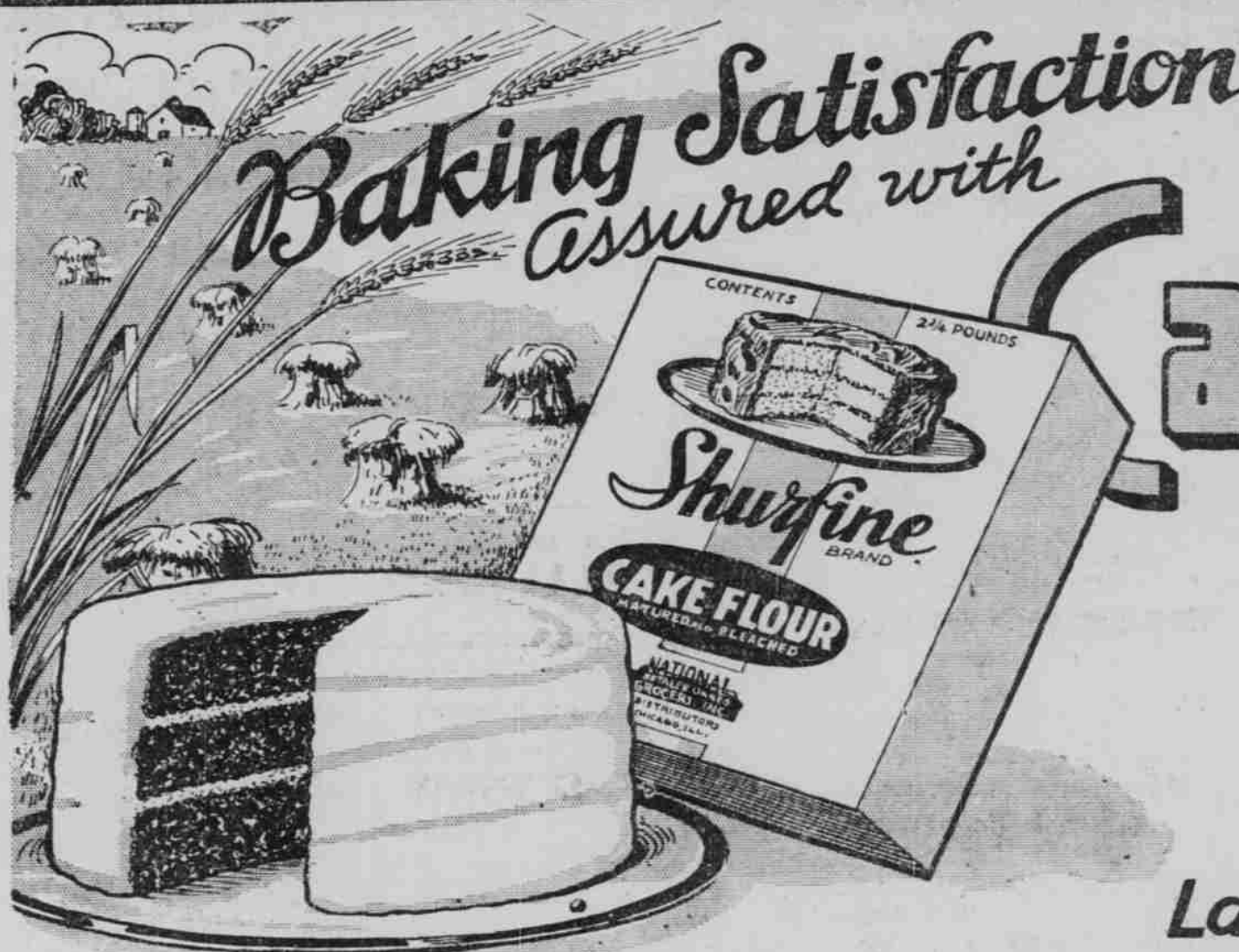
