Illinois Wesleyan Breaks Precedents

In Selection of W. G. Brooks Institution Selects First Layman as School Head.

The Christian Student, a publication of the Methodist church, has a very interesting article in their current issue on Dr. Wiley G. Brooks, LLD, former resident of Plattsmouth and just recently named as head of the Illinois Wesleyan college at Midgets 0. Bloomington.

Dr. Brooks will relinquish his duties as superintendent of schools at Burlington, Iowa, and president of the Burlington Junior college to assume full authority at Illinois Wesleyan, December 1st.

Though he is a minister's son, Dr. Brooks is the first person not an ordained minister of the Methodist Episcopal church to be named head of the institution in its eighty-seven years of history.
