



The deepest point of the channel where the tunnel would pass is 310 feet, although the sea-bottom to the left and right of the projected boring, slants down to a depth of more than 975 feet. It is explained that this shelf of land is a continuation of one of the Apennine ridges from the mainland to Sicily.
