On the night of Jack's seventeenth birthday, Mrs. Reynolds was given an excellent opportunity to observe the unfortunate effect which defective teeth may have on a child's personality.

Among the guests at Jack's party was a young man of Jack's age—George Richmond. George was tall, dark, slender, and rather good looking except that his face was expressionless. He rarely smiled and seldom spoke. When he did speak, Mrs. Reynolds noticed that his hand covered his mouth or his lips were so tightly drawn that she could scarcely hear his words.

Feeling that his shyness and timidity would ruin his entire evening, she cleverly managed to select him for her dinner partner. Not until George began to eat did she realize the cause of his shyness. He was suffering from a severe case of dental neglect. One of his upper front teeth was missing and several more were badly decayed. Instantly, she recalled Dr. Young's lecture on the influence of decayed teeth on behavior.

Mrs. Reynolds made it her business to become better acquainted with George's mother. She learned from Mrs. Reynolds that early in life George had developed a decided antipathy towards dentistry. Try as she would, she could not persuade her son to take care of his teeth or to allow a dentist to repair them.

"You know," explained Mrs. Richmond, excusing her son's behavior, "even as a child George objected so strenuously to having his teeth fixed that I didn't have the heart to insist on the matter. Poor dear, I don't know what is going to become of him. He is so ashamed of his teeth that he won't go anywhere or do anything. I can scarcely get him to leave the house. In fact, recently he was objecting to going to school. I'm so worried about him, I do want him to finish high school."

After this conversation, Mrs. Reynolds was more sorry than ever for George. Obviously, he was the victim of an overindulgent mother. Had Mrs. Richmond been less concerned about George's childish wishes and more concerned about his future, his present behavior problems would not have existed. Young men entering the business world today must be physically and mentally equipped to cope with life's battles. George, because of his extreme dental defects, is handicapped from the very beginning.
