RIVER SHOWING RISE

It is expected by the army engineer offices at Omaha that the river will show a six foot rise by Thursday night and be the highest since last July.

Whether the high water will be sufficient to cause overflow of the lowlands along the Missouri from Sioux City south has not been determined as the improvement work
