

A. E. F. Baptized by Somme Fire 2 Decades Ago

First United States Units Hurdled Against Hindenburg Line March 21, 1918.

PARIS (UP)—Twenty years ago the young American army went into battle for the first time to help stem the Germans' last drive in the north when Field Marshal Paul Von Hindenburg hurled all his reserves at the Somme front in an effort to break through to Amiens and separate the British and French armies.

The Hindenburg drive began with a mighty blow March 21, 1918, and the British army, its reserves virtually all used up after four years of fighting, was beaten back. Five days later, at the height of the battle a small force of American engineers who had been repairing roads and building bridges behind the British front were swept up with all the remaining reserves and thrown into the battle to stem the German advance.

These first Americans to fight were from the 6th U. S. Engineers, and the 12th and 14th Railway Engi-

neers, with parts of the 17th, 22nd, 28th and 148th U. S. Aero Squadrons. Trowing down their shovels and their tools, grabbing up rifles, they went into battle and fought courageously. Under a British general, Carey, this poorly equipped force of mixed Americans, French, Canadians, Australians and English held back the Germans between Marcelcave and Hamel.

They prevented the German artillery from pushing on to a point where they could shell Amiens, a vital railroad center which kept the whole British army supplied with food and munitions. The battle turned on March 28. The German onslaught slowed down, for Hindenburg had taken terrific losses in his vain attempt to break through. The British were so weak they could not counter-attack, so finally the battle petered out April 6.

But the German army never again tried to break through in the north, and although Hindenburg again threw the rest of his army against the French at the Marne in the summer of 1918—another battle where the American troops helped their allies check a German drive, at Belleau Wood and Chateau Thierry—the German army had lost its punch, and from that time on the Allies took the offensive.

As one consequence of the Somme drive, the Allies realized the necessity of coordinating their efforts because daily the British and French grew weaker and used up their last reserves as the American army continued to grow until by late summer there were 2,000,000 doughboys in France. A few weeks later, the governments conferred and finally decided to name Ferdinand Foch as supreme commander of all the Allied armies.

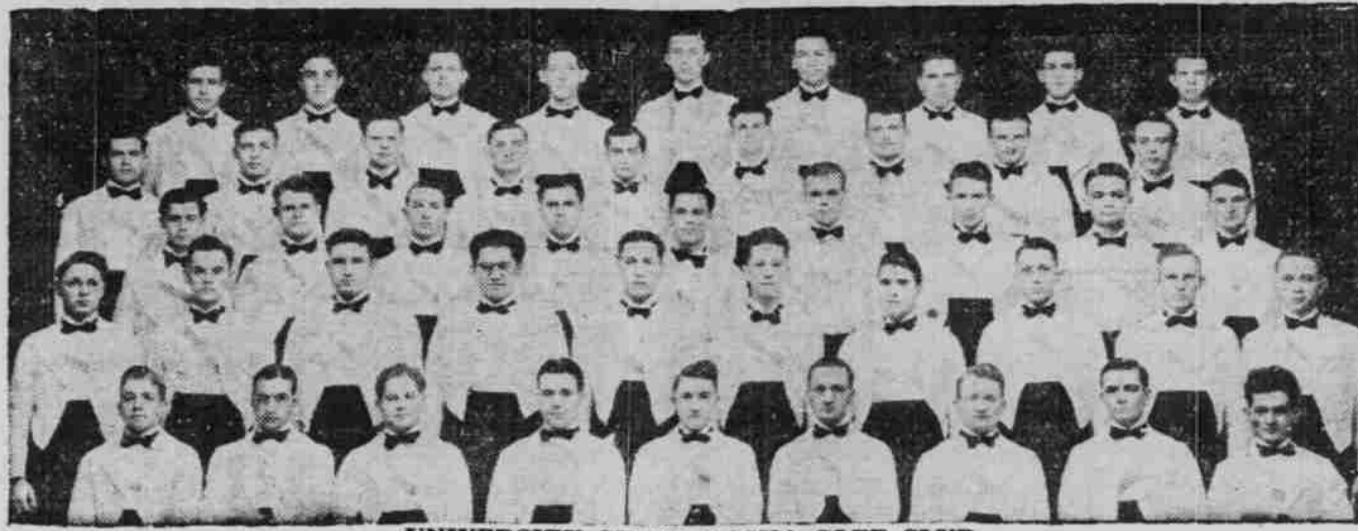

University of Nebraska Glee Club Concert



UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA GLEE CLUB

The University of Nebraska men's glee club, under the baton of William G. Tempel, director of choral music on the school of music faculty, will present a program of outstanding compositions arranged for male voices at Weeping Water the evening of April 5. Conductor Tempel has chosen a repertoire of numbers distinctly pleasing to all groups and all ages, a good many of the numbers having been presented at the glee club's annual spring concert in Lincoln recently before a large audience.

Weeping Water is represented in the glee club by Duane Harmon, who sings second tenor and who also will be heard in a trumpet solo, "My Heart at Thy Sweet Voice" from "Samson and Delilah" by Saint-Saens. Harmon is a junior in the college of arts and sciences.

In addition to the ensemble numbers proper, there will be several other feature events, including vocal solos by Dale Ganz of Alvo, baritone, and Nate Holman of Lincoln, tenor. A male quartet will also present a group of three selections.

The concert opens with three numbers from the pen of Schubert, Schumann and Koshetz.
