The youthful twirling star of the locals executed what no other pitcher wearing a Plattsmouth uniform has ever done before—defeating a team by pitching a no-hit, no-run, no-walk game. Only one Ashlander got as far as second, and in addition to the previously mentioned feats, "Gabby" also whiffed 15 aspiring Ashland batters and was equally effective on the offense. In his first appearance at the plate "Gabby" reached first on an error. On his next four attempts he crashed out three singles and a double.

Not an Ashland representative got on base for five innings. Hoffman reached first on an error in the sixth. Sticheran also saw the initial sack on an error, later reaching second on another error as Hoffman again reached first.

In the first inning the Merchants started in a workmanship-like manner, scoring one run as lead-off man Herb Sundstrom was safe on an error and scored no "Dusty" Rhoades' double. In the third Bob Hayes singled and went to second on "Gabby's" first single. "Stub" Sedlak then drove Bob home with a booming double. The Platters' third tally came as "Gabby" doubled, and scored on another hard-hit double by Jack O'Donnell. In the 7th "Tex" Chovanec tripled and then scored on an infield out. In the eighth "Gabby" again singled; "Stub" was walked and both scored on Don Wall's single to center.

The local team, by virtue of its impressive showing, and through the remarkable accomplishments of its speed-ball artist, is now rated as the contending team for top honors of the league and Manager Ray Shafter is looking optimistically toward future contests.

Every member of the victorious Merchants is deserving of congratulations for his showing, but too much can't be said about "Gabby," who is now a member of that select and exclusive group of hurlers who has to his credit a no-hit, no-run game.
