

Catching Up on Poor Relief as Load Lighter

Easing Up of Need Thru Summer and Tax Receipts Permit the Payment of Old Claims

At its October meetings, the Cass county Board of Commissioners allowed many claims against the Poor Relief fund, dating back to late winter and early spring, which have been on file for some time, help up due to depleted balance in that fund. Demands upon the fund have grown steadily each year, and although a very sizeable tax levy is made to take care of relief costs, it has been necessary to delay payment of claims sometimes for months until money is on hand to meet them.

Wally May Soon be Accepted in Royal Family

Visit of Duke and Duchess of Gloucester Believed Will Result in End of Royal Rift

PARIS, Nov. 12 (UP)—The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester and Windsor are parting today with such a show of affection that it seemed the estrangement of Great Britain's royal family was ended, and the former Wallis Simpson of America would soon be accepted in its ranks. The Duke of Windsor, who abandoned the throne two years ago to marry Mrs. Simpson, was described as "happy as a boy" that his brother had come to visit, and it was reported that a contributing factor to his joy was that the visit had been suggested by King George, their reigning brother, as a prelude to inviting the Windsors to England. The Dukes and Duchesses were out until after midnight today celebrating the reunion, beginning at the famous Lutetia restaurant, on the place De La Madeleine. A few intimates were with them. The Duke and Duchess of Gloucester planned to return to London by airplane today. They were en route home from Africa in a plane piloted by E. H. Fielden, captain of the King's Flight, and arranged the stopover here, reportedly on instructions from London. In London the news Chronicle said it had learned on good authority that the Windsors were likely to return to England soon and probably would establish their home at the Duke's former Fort Belvedere residence. The newspaper said it was believed that the meeting of the Dukes and Duchesses marks the beginning of reconciliation. Paris gossip notes particularly the warmth of the two Duchesses' greetings. A short time after the reunion yesterday they were alone in animated conversation, leaving the Dukes in another room. The Dukes were said to have discussed general topics, and especially the Gloucesters' African trip, but it was doubted that the subject of the Windsors' exile came up. The two couples had lunch together in the Windsors' apartment yesterday, then went to visit the Windsors' new home on Boulevard Saclay, which they plan to occupy in two or three weeks. The Duchesses explored the decoration plans, and were together incessantly throughout the day.

POPEYE A SISSY?

ROME, Nov. 12 (UP)—Popeye has been branded a sissy. He, Mickey Mouse and other child favorites of comic strip and juvenile story are to be barred from Italy in the interest of totalitarian education of children. "Our aim is to raise children in the firm imperialist spirit of the Fascist revolution," said Dr. Girolamo Casini of the ministry of popular culture in making the announcement at a national conference on literature for children at Bologna. "We have to look after the spiritual formation of youths. We must follow II Duce's orders to sleep with our heads on a soldier's knapsack. We have decided to revive in a totalitarian manner the principles underlying present juvenile literature." The government, Casini said, must look to the future, considering that the child of today will be the soldier of tomorrow. American artists and authors, and among them particularly Walt Disney, will be hard hit. Disney's Mickey Mouse has been an outstanding favorite along with the undisciplined Donald Duck.

OLD TESTAMENT MAY BE BANNED IN GERMANY

BERLIN, Nov. 12 (UP)—Julius Streicher, leader of the extreme anti-Jewish element in the Nazi party, intimated in a speech at Nuremberg today that the Old Testament might be excluded from schools as religious instruction. "Germany's teachers will cease immediately to recant the untrue Jewish hero tales, as they have heretofore been forced to do, and will now preach Christ's true words," he said. At Nuremberg, Streicher's stronghold, and at Furtch the police ordered that license numbers of automobiles owned by Jews must be withdrawn in a certain specified range.

STATES POSITION

LINCOLN, Nov. 12 (UP)—R. L. Cochran took issue today with Charles W. Bryan's statement that the governor and Charles J. Warner had shifted position during the campaign to support Bryan's pension and homestead tax exemption program. "I do not and have not changed my position an iota, and do not intend to," Governor Cochran said. On the contrary, the governor expressed belief that his opponents had come around to his view that old age assistance should be based on individual need.

WOMAN WINS HUSKING TITLE
