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### Landmark Being Razored

Later, in the early 90's the Missouri Pacific extended its line into Lincoln from Union and the town of Wabash was formed. E. E. At that time, Mr. Cowles, his father-in-law, moved a residence property from South Bend to Wabash for the family to reside in. In later years many people have resided in this home.
