

Death of Former Plattsmouth Lady Occurs in Idaho

Mrs. Frank Hronek Dies at Pocatello, Idaho, After Long Period of Failing Health.

From Saturday's Daily—
Relatives here today received the message of the death last night at Pocatello, Idaho, of Mrs. Frank Hronek, 60, a former resident of Plattsmouth, which came at the close of an illness that has covered the past two years and in which she has been gradually failing until the end.
The deceased lady, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Kalasek, was born in Plattsmouth and spent her younger years in this city and where forty-one years ago she was married to Frank Hronek and later they moved to the west where they located at Pocatello and have since resided there.
Mr. Hronek has been engaged as an inspector for the Union Pacific on

their Pacific northwest lines for a great many years.
There are twelve children with the father left to mourn the passing of Mrs. Hronek, all of the family residing in and near Pocatello and were with the mother in her last days.
She is survived by three sisters and five brothers, Frank, Wesley, Julius, Edward Kalasek of this city, Anton Kalasek of Milwaukee, Wis., Mrs. Michael Bajack and Mrs. J. M. Sedlak of this city and Mrs. Joseph Wales of Omaha.
Mrs. Bajack and Julius Kalasek are departing this evening for Pocatello where they will attend the funeral services.
