Thirteen years ago they moved to Denver, where they have since made their home. She leaves to mourn her passing, her husband, Chas. W. Bish, one daughter, Mrs. Barbara Murphy, of Los Angeles. A son, 9 years old, preceded her in death. One brother, Albert Barry, of Seattle.
