Basle Doubly Protected

Even if an invading force reached the German railroad station in would be the bridge across the Rhine to be crossed before the major part of the town of Basle could be taken.

Germany's extraterritorial rights in the railroad station at Kleinbasel are defined in the treaty of 1852. This lays down that in time of peace a maximum of 30 German soldiers are allowed to pass through the German station at a time, and without ammunition.

Swiss officials who are constantly on duty in and near the station are given free access and there also are five days to cite authorities as to several Swiss offices in the station itself. five days to file a reply brief.
