The Washington dispatches say that a widow's pension has been allowed Sarah Archer, of Plattsmouth. Our former journalistic friend, Thos. E. Williams, who now resides on a farm near Louisville, was in town last Saturday. The river went out Saturday—that is the ice in the river went out—and our free ice bridge is no more. Ex-Mayor Richey journeyed to Creston, Iowa, Thursday evening to attend the funeral of late Judge McDill, whose demise occurred at that town on Wednesday. A dispatch in Friday's Lincoln Journal from Hastings reads as follows: "Mr. and Mrs. Sherman Knee are rejoicing over the recent birth to them of a fine boy." At the term of district court just closed in Mills county, Iowa, six divorce cases were heard and decrees granted. In some cases marriage appears to be a failure. Mr. Jno. Eidmann and Miss Clara G. Fels of this county were married at Nebraska City, and the News of that town remarks that they "were a handsome-looking couple." Jailor Denson has been doing some much-needed painting and calmsomining over at the county jail the past several days, which greatly improves the appearance of the interior of that place. Cois. Druessow, of Nebraska City, and Banning, of Nehawka, were initiated into the mysteries of the Orient at G. A. R. hall Tuesday, and are now full-fledged princes of the oriental realms. The city of Deadwood, S. D., was visited by a serious conflagration Monday morning, and a great portion of the best business houses were burned to the ground. The loss will reach close to \$200,000. Captain H. E. Parmer, formerly of this city, but now of Omaha, has increased his donation to the distillery project from \$400 to \$1000. Would that the city of Plattsmouth might possess a few more such citizens. W. L. Hall journeyed to Furnas county yesterday to superintend the erection of a new house on his farm in that county. Baxter Smith of this city will build the house, and he departed this afternoon to commence work. Somebody tore several of the deck planks off the wagon bridge at Louisville last Thursday night, which delayed travel for a short while. The bridge was promptly repaired, however, without calling on the county board to attend to the matter. The board of education met in regular session at the court house Monday and passed on the usual claims and accounts and discussed other matters relating to the schools. The board took no action on the matter of suspensions, as no complaints were filed. Dr. Theodore P. Livingston and wife departed Monday afternoon for Philadelphia, Penn., whether the former goes to attend the Philadelphia Polyclinic for some weeks. During his absence his brother, Dr. Robert Livingston, will attend to his local practice. A correspondent asks the question in the Albia (La.) Democrat, "Do hogs pay?" "No. They take the paper a year or two, then put it back in the office to be marked 'refused,' and generally the hog who is able to pay does this." Mr. Jno. W. Young and family departed last Friday for their new home near Firth, Nebraska, where they will reside on a farm. Mr. Young has been a foreman in the local B. & M. machine shops for several years and his departure is much to be regretted. Developments in the distillery project are expected in the very near future, which, if they materialize, will give the average Plattsmouthian an opportunity to arise and deliver a collection of large-sized yells of joyful

glee. Plattsmouth people are strong in lung power, and they stand an excellent chance to exercise them freely within the next few days. A free ferry across the Missouri river at Plattsmouth is now an assured fact. This will have the effect of drawing considerable trade from the Iowa bottoms and is a commendable stroke of enterprise on the part of the business men of our neighboring city, by whom the expense is borne.—Nehawka Register. Hon. R. B. Windham denies the report that he will remove to Omaha. The recent transfer of several pieces of his realty, valued at \$52,000 to Dr. Hart, of Omaha, in exchange for Omaha property, will not affect his residence here, as he has yet considerable real estate and other interests in this city. The result of the deal may possibly result in Dr. Hart's removal to this city. The Glenwood Tribune says: "The cheapest piece of land that has been sold in Mills county for some years was an 80 acres belonging to E. R. S. A New Monte Carlo. From Omaha comes the following: It is whispered about in gambling circles that a project is on foot to establish a Monte Carlo at East Omaha similar to the world-famed institution at Monaco. A syndicate of wealthy gamblers, it is claimed, is to be formed with a view of locating, as near as they can get to Courtland beach, a four-story brick structure, with a spacious interior, handsomely tiled, frescoed and decorated, large enough to accommodate a score or more green cloth tables.
