NEEDED LEGISLATION.

First and Second Class Cities Will Seek Relief.

LAWYERS MUCH NEED REVISION.

Mayors and City Attorneys For Nebraska Cities Meet at Lincoln and Discuss Municipal Matters of Importance—Jottings.

A meeting of the mayors and city attorneys representing the several first and second-class cities in Nebraska was held in Lincoln Thursday, the object being for the discussion and formulation of plans for some needed legislation to be sought at the hands of the state legislature. Mayor Newell of this city was in attendance and reports a good attendance and an abundance of genuine interest. The question of assessing property at its full valuation was discussed at considerable length, and the sentiment was unanimous that the present system of assessing property at a fractional part of its value was a detriment to the entire state and more especially to cities of the first and second class. The registration law was also discussed, the sentiment being general that the expense occasioned to the cities was needlessly large. It was finally voted as the sense of the meeting that the law should be revised so as to require a general registration but once in two years, while a revision of the voters could be had on one day prior to other elections. A committee of three was appointed to draft two bills for presentation to the legislature embodying the ideas adopted by the meeting, and a second session was called to meet at Lincoln on Jan. 15th, when the bills as drafted will come before the meeting for adoption. A concerted action, such as described above, is certainly a move in the right direction, and if the matter is presented in the proper light to the legislature there is every reason for believing that the desired relief will be obtained.
