

SCENT OF ONION.

By Any Other Name Than Sulphuret of Allyle It Would Be as Sweet.

It is interesting to make inquiry into the cause of this unfortunate quality of the onion. It is simply due to the presence in some quantity in the bulb of sulphur. It is this sulphur that gives the onion its germ-killing property and makes the bulb so very useful a medicinal agent at all times, but especially in the spring which used to be—and still is in many places—the season for taking brimstone and treacle in old-fashioned houses before sulphur tablets came into vogue. Now, sulphur, when united to hydrogen, forms sulphuretted hydrogen, and then becomes a foul-smelling compound. The onion, being a juicy, has a very large percentage of water in its tissues, and this combining with the sulphur, forms the strongly scented and offensive substance called sulphuret of allyle. This sulphuret of allyle mingles more especially with the volatile or aromatic oil of the onion; it is identical with the malodorous principle found in asafetida which is almost the symbol of all smells that are nasty. The horse radish and the ordinary mustard & our tables both owe their strong stimulative properties to this same sulphuret of allyle, which gives them heat and acidity, but not an offensive smell, owing to the different arrangement of the atoms in their volatile oils. This brings us to a most curious fact in nature, that most strangely, yet most certainly constructs all vegetable volatile oils in exactly the same way—composes them all, whether they are the aromatic essences of cloves, oranges, lemons, cinnamon, thyme, rose, verbena, turpentine or onion, of exactly the same proportion which are 81% of carbon to 11% of hydrogen, and obtains all the vast seeming diversities that our nostrils detect in their scent simply by a different arrangement of the atoms in each vegetable oil.—Chambers' Journal.

Shirtwaist to Be Popular.

The shirtwaist promises to be extremely popular next summer. Salesmen for the furnishing houses who are now on the road, are sending in large orders for shirtwaists for next spring, and report that the demand will probably be heavy. Manufacturers report that the demand for such garments has far exceeded their expectations, and that they will be compelled to make up many more goods in that shape than they anticipated.

Troops on the March.

A single battalion of infantry 1,000 strong, which is the strength of an English battalion, takes up a road length of 523 yards, including about eighty yards for stragglers. A battery of field artillery takes up 296 yards and a regiment of cavalry takes up, when marching four abreast, 656 yards. An army corps, with its staff, wagons, guns, hospitals, etc., would extend over thirty-four miles.

Paper Walls at Indian Head.

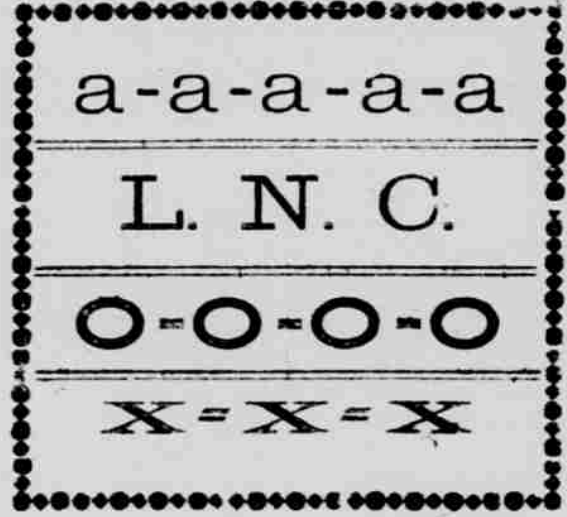
Postoffice Widens Its Scope.
