

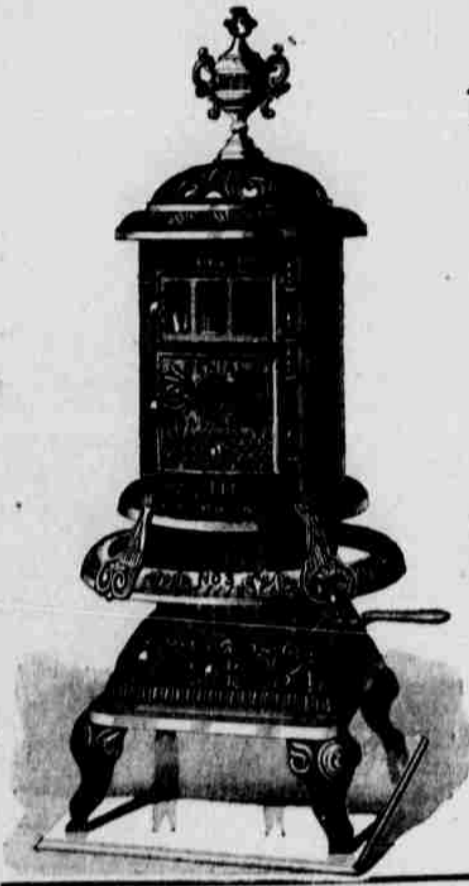

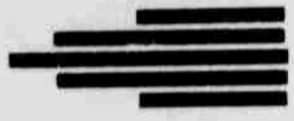

The first gun made by the... is now in the possession of Mrs. H. I. Miller of Chattanooga, whose father made it at Holly Springs, Miss., in 1801. It originally had a rifled barrel and is still in good condition.

A resident of Hartland, Vt., is the possessor of a Bible for which he has been offered \$200. It was printed in London, England, in 1676, and brought to this country by Caleb Cullton, grandfather of the present owner.

No president of the United States was ever re-elected unless he was himself a soldier or held a chief executive office during a war period. Washington, a soldier of the Revolution; Jefferson, a governor of Virginia during the Revolutionary War; Madison, president at the outbreak of the war with Great Britain; Monroe, a Revolutionary officer; Jackson, a soldier of the 1812 war; Lincoln, a soldier and president during the Civil War; Grant, a soldier of the Mexican and Civil War.

The original political parties in this country were the Federalist and the Anti-Federalist. The Democratic-Republican party appeared in 1794, and took the place of the Anti-Federalist party when Jefferson was elected in 1800. After 1816 the Federal party is not heard of. In 1800 the Democratic-Republican party dropped the second name and accepted the first as its title. The Whigs came into the front in 1836, when W. H. Harrison ran for the first time. In 1848 he was elected. The Whigs were crushed in 1852, and in 1856 the present Republican party appeared.
