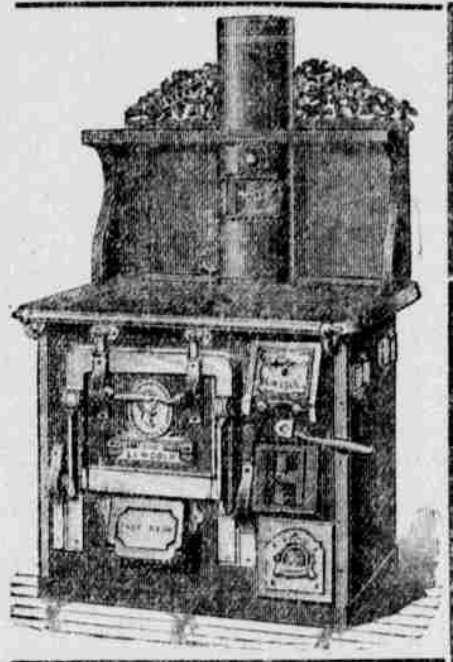

The Campaign in Lancaster. The populists made a clean and aggressive campaign in Lancaster county and the result shows no falling off in the party vote. Perhaps the meanest thing of the campaign was the publication by the opposition of affidavits of the most questionable characters reflecting upon Sheriff Miller and the cause he represents.

The republicans carried the county by pluralities ranging from 800 to 2,500 and elected their entire county and judicial ticket.

Mr. Trompen defeated Fred A. Miller for sheriff by a plurality of 733. Sam Low's plurality for clerk of the court was 1007 over Elias Baker, while Judge Tibbetts was defeated by about 2000 votes. Messrs. Miller, Baker and Tibbetts in retiring from office in this county leave a record of which they as well as their party may justly feel proud and in which even their bitterest opponents can find no discrepancies. Let us hope and trust the newly elected officers will serve the people, as faithful and well as the retiring populists have done.

Mr. Berge, Mr. Walters and Mr. Richardson each did their part and added all their force for the success of the ticket.

Cochran's plurality over Berge is 2,073. Trimble defeated Walters for county clerk by 4,786 and Beckman defeated Richardson for commissioner 3,965 votes.

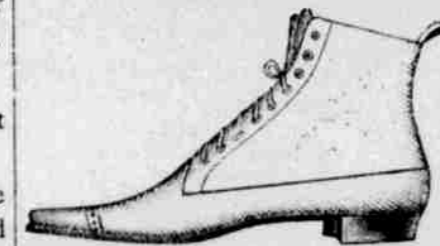

Nothing will give such a polish to glass, even the finest, as slightly moist newspaper to wash it and dry newspaper to give the finishing touches.

Letting clothes hang after they are dry, or letting them hang through a storm, or in windy weather to slap about, is not conducive to long wearing or to help the good man's pocket-book.

A clothespin bag, made of bed ticking or something stout, in the form of a pocket with a slit on the front side, is much easier to get at than a common bag. A bed ticking apron with a large pocket across the bottom is better than other.

A new method of cleaning clothes is suggested. Dip the clothes brush in the yolk of an egg, so that the bristles are quite wet. Allow it to dry and then use. This treatment has, it is said, the effect to make the brushing especially effective.
