GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP. Government ownership of railroads and telegraph, as advocated by the F. A. & I. U. is a very timely book just received for review. There is a great effort being made to induce us to believe the transportation question is of little or no importance, but as long as the rule is to charge all the traffic will bear, when prices advance rates do the same. This can never be a government for the people while all our means of transportation of wealth or news is owned by soulless corporations, who are today defying the authority of the government to make them carry mails or freight without they run the Pullman cars, and who own the executive of the nation and almost every state, who seek to do their bidding regardless of the welfare of the rest of the nation. It is time this book was read by Alliance members who should bear in mind that it is the position taken by the National Alliance and that every true member will do all in power to aid in bringing about these objects. Tourists from Minnesota Points. How to Broil Veal or Pork. Veal and pork must be broiled slowly and for a long time. There should not be a trace of pink in the fibers when the meat is done. The chops should not be cut more than half an inch thick. They will be well done with 12 minutes' cooking.

How to Prevent the Rusting of Screws. Before using dip them in melted tallow or raw linseed oil. This will also prepare them to be drawn easily.
