### FOR LEAN MEAL.

Breeding and Feeding Hogs to Produce Muscle and Less Fat. Below are some reproductions of photographs which illustrate an attempt to

feed hogs for that lean meat which is now so much wanted in pork. The pictures are from cuts of the pork made after the animals were slaughtered. They show the proportion of fat and





lean made by the different methods of feeding. Hogs fed on corn alone, of course, ran to fat. Those receiving a mixture of corn and cowpeas made much lean meat and made their gain at least expense.

Those fed on a mixture of corn and wheat bran gave about the same lean meat as the corn and cowpea lot, but at a slightly greater cost for feeding. In deciding on what to feed it would be a question to be settled according to the locality of the feeder, whether cowpeas or wheat bran is the cheaper.

Of the four lots of hogs fed we give here pictures of samples of lot No. 1, fed on corn alone, and of No. 8, fed on corn and cowpeas.

The Alabama agricultural station, where the experiments were made, has led the way in a most useful field of investigation.

In summing up results as published in the Alabama station bulletin The National Stockman says:

The lean meat hog is undoubtedly gaining in favor. Consumers demand more lean and less fat than formerly, and slaughterers are paying more for lightweight hogs than for those which contain a large proportion of lard. The difference in price in western markets between the packing hog and the lean meat hog-at least during the winter season when most hogs are marketedis hardly great enough as yet to justify producers in discarding their present breeding stock and their cheap corn and producing lean meat hogs by a different system of breeding and feeding, but the tendency is in that direction, and indications are that the premium on the lean meat hog will some time amply repay producers for making special efforts to put him on the market.

Both breeding and feeding are factors in the problem of the lean meat hog. The experiment at the Alabama station conducted by Professor J. F. Duggar was made with 12 pure bred Essex pigs, of as near the same size and quality as possible, divided into four lots of three each. The pigs were all fed on corn exclusively for 21 days, after which the feed was changed and the feeding continned for 16 weeks.

Lot I had corn alone, lot 2 cowpeas, lot 3 equal weights of corn and cowpeas, and lot 4 equal weights of corn and wheat bran. The corn had a nutritive ratio of 1 to 9.7, cowpeas of 1 to ye? 3.6, corn and cowpeas of 1 to 6.2 and the





LOT NO. 3, FED ON CORN AND COWPEAS. pounds of digestible matter in the corn years? to make a pound of gain during the 16 corn and bran. Note that the pigs fed on the balanced ration made the cheap est gain.

The pigs were slaughtered at the end of the test and the carcasses photographed in order to illustrate the results.
