#### STATE OIL INSPECTOR

The Report of J. H. Edmisten is in Siriking Contrast to That of his Republican Predecessor.

One of the rottenest chapters in the history of republican rule in Nebrasks is that connected with the state inspection of oils, and every republican who has held the position of oil inspector has lined his pockets with money that should have been turned into the state treasury. The last republican who held this important position retired from office with several thousand dollars of the state's money unaccounted for and suit is still pending against him in the supreme court of the state asking for an ac-counting of the funds that came into

his hands during his term. Three and a half years ago the voters of the state placed the executive branch of the state government in the hands of the reform party and a reform inspector of oils was appointed, and the work of reform begun in the office. How well that work has been performed will be seen from the following statement of the amount shown as a surplus of funds coming into the hands of the chief inspector after the payment of all salaries and expenses from February 1,

1895, to July 1, 1898: Surplus for the year 1895....\$1,688.33 Surplus for the year 1896.... 1,785.47 Surplus for the year 1897.... 2,025.96 Surplus first half year 1898.. 1,027.17
