licans passed a bill to give the bankers \$84,541,064.22 more than the face value for their bonds, which is another gift to earn raising corn and wheat.

Mr. Gage says that the cash premiums on the old bonds will amount to 5.6851 per cent for the 3s. 11.6765 for the 4s. and 10.0751 for the 5s. That makes \$84,-541,064.22 to be paid out in cash, if all the bonds are exchanged. The interest on \$839,146,490 of new bonds at 2 per cent for thirty years will amount to \$503,-487,894, making the total payments above the present face of the bonds

In the case of fifty-seven of the best known banks and trust companies the increase in the value of individual stocks ranged, at the close of 1899, from 20 per cent for the Irving, Citizens, Republic, and others, to 300 per cent for the Fifth Avenue bank and the Mercantile company, 450 per cent for the Garfield bank 600 per cent for the City National bank. to 625 per cent for the Central Trust company and 750 per cent for the First National bank.
