### INTO A SEA OF FLAME

Terrible Experience of a Train Load of Heroes in Pennsylvania. A FEARFUL RIDE TO DEATH.

While Running a Fiery Gauntlet the Bulls Speed, Wrecking the Train—Seven Perished, Miserably and Thirty Were Badly Injured.

COCKSPORT, Pa., May 12.—The towns of Austin, Costello, Galeton and Moore's run, in Potter county, are on the verge of a panic, two especially being threatened with annihilation from fires that seem to form an impenetrable wall on every side. The forest fires have crept steadily toward the helpless towns until it was seen the people must fight back the flames or have their homes burned down over their heads.

At Moore's Run a train load of seventy-five willing men sent out from Austin Sunday night, had been fighting back the fires, but were finally obliged to retreat. The men boarded the train, but to late. They were hemmed in by the forest fire on one side and a huge skidway of logs on the other. It was finally decided to dash by the burning skidway, and the engineer and fireman, with faces covered with dampened cloths and their heads and arms wrapped in wool, mounted the little engine and pulled out through the wall of fire.

Superintendent Badger was in charge of the relief train. He was slowly burned to death.

Six others also miserably perished and thirty others of the party were badly burned, many probably fatally.

Seven others, as yet, are missing and their fate is not known, though they are likely in the charred wood of the logs on the train.

Michigan Forest Fires. DETROIT, Mich., May 12.—The Toledo, Ann Arbor and Northern Michigan railroad has been obliged to abandon all attempts to run cars north of the Clare county line on account of the forest fires.

Modified Husk's Orders. CHEYENNE, Wyo., May 12.—A conference held here by Special Agent Pickett of the bureau of animal industry and the Wyoming state veterinarian with the governor resulted in rescinding a clause in Secretary Husk's order regarding the shipment of southern cattle, which prohibits these cattle being in pens or driven on trails in Wyoming that are to be occupied or crossed by cattle going to eastern markets before Dec. 1, 1891.

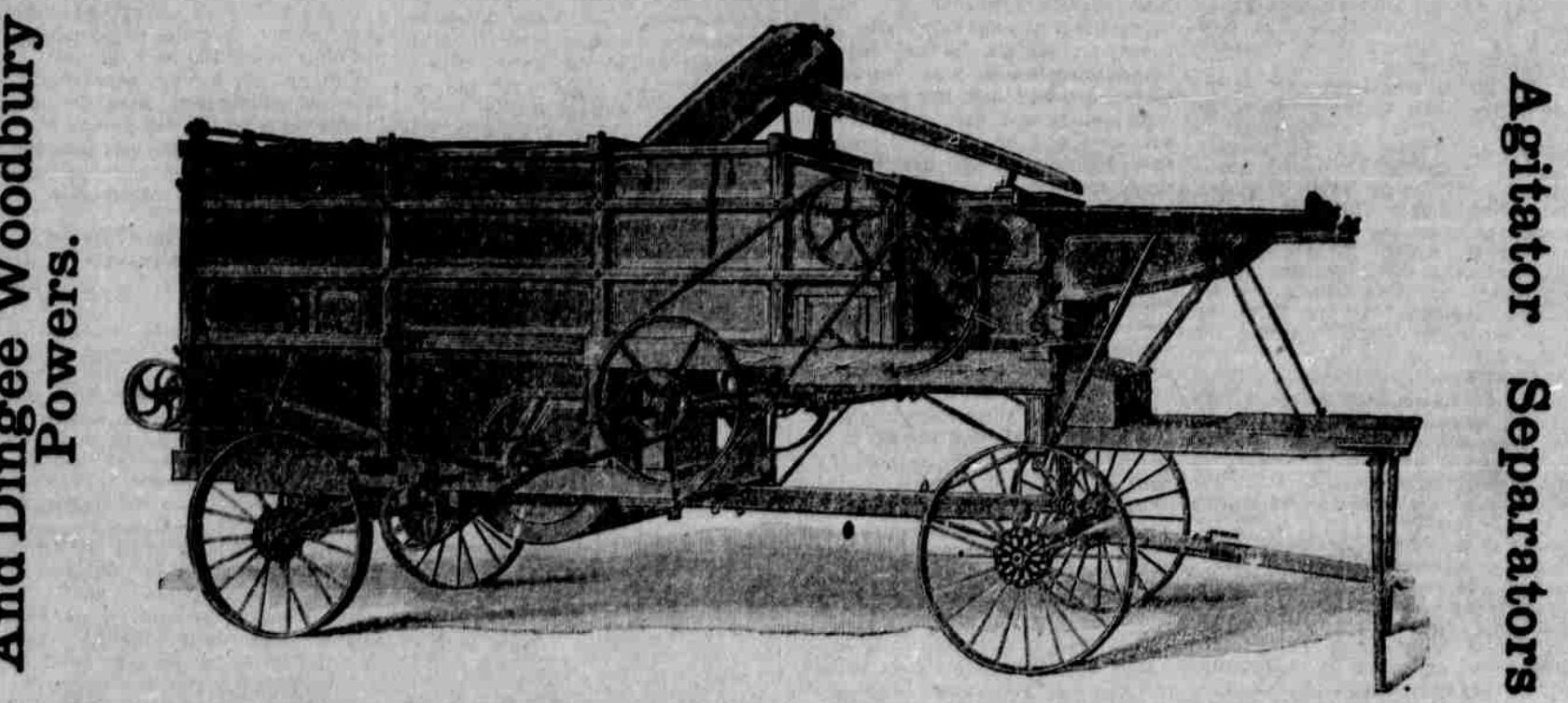

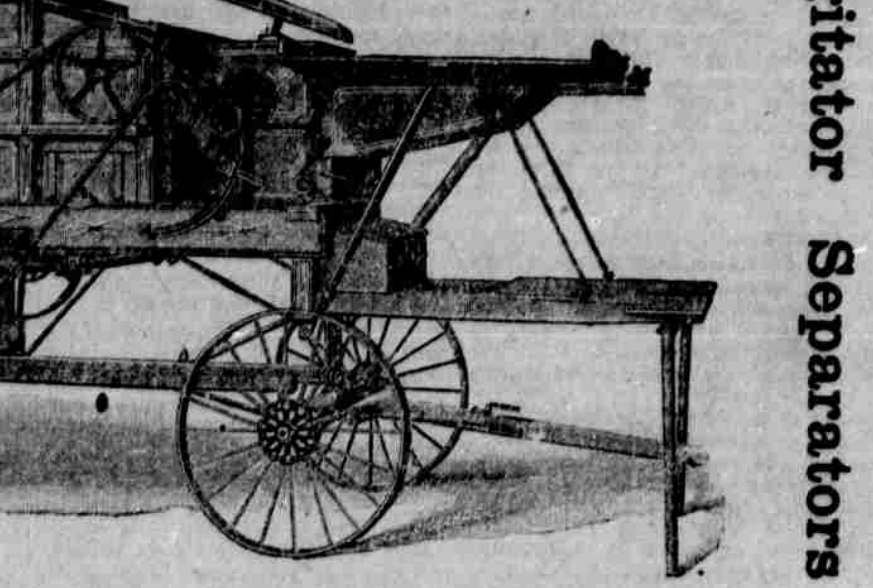

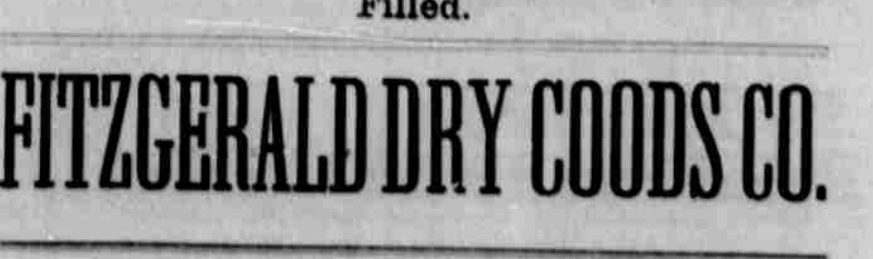
