Protecting Workman From Furnace Heat—Why a Man Can't Fly—An Automatic Candlestick—Advice to Amateur Photographers.

A New York Air Ship.

There seems to be a prevailing impression that air navigation will soon be an accomplished fact. N. Helmer of 129 Fourth avenue is now at work on designs for an aerial ship in which the electric motor operated with storage batteries will be the power to whirl the vessel through space.

The balloon sails laterally and carries a finlike sail which causes it to face the wind. It is connected with the car by means of a number of ropes converging at a swivel several feet above the car proper.

He proposes to make the outer balloon of aluminum sheets prepared so as to withstand five pounds' pressure to the square inch. The inside balloon will be made of varnished silk so as to swell and decrease in size at will.

Protecting Workman From Furnace Heat.

At one of the German iron works, an ingenious method has been adopted of protecting the workmen at the puddling and heating furnaces from the heat.

A rectangular iron screen is hung from an overhead rail, and can be made to cover the whole working side of the furnace, or can be pushed aside when not required, or when it interferes with the work of the men.

Why a Man Can't Fly.

Professor Haxen, of the Signal Office, says there are insurmountable obstacles to perfecting a flying machine. Professor Haxen states the main obstacles thus:

1. It is impossible to use the food which the bird uses to develop power by any contrivances which can ever be invented that will give one the effect that the bird gets.

2. It is impossible, by the most delicate mechanism and most perfect wings, to equal the perfection and adaptability of the birds in their own element.

3. There is a limit of weight beyond which it is impossible for a bird to fly. It is probable that the ostrich had the power of flight in ages gone by, but when its environment became such that it did not need its wings to escape from enemies, or when it began to grow larger from any favoring circumstances, it found its wings less and less on the way to its entirely incapable condition.

An Automatic Candlestick.

The well-known mechanical engineer, Mr. Frank Jenkins, has found time, amid the distractions of other business, to invent a patent candlestick which is both handsome in its appearance and automatic in its operation, and possesses, among other merits, those of being durable and comparatively inexpensive.

The candle being held in a spring frame, is caused to burn entirely down without readjusting the holder, and without any waste or fouling. When the candle is burned, the remaining piece of wax and the few remaining drops of the candle fall automatically into the removable bowl from which all may be easily emptied, and the candlestick is then clean and ready for another candle.

Advice to Amateur Photographers.

A Bogardus, in a recent article, gives some excellent advice to amateur photographers. He says: "If you would succeed in your experiments let everything you use be the best of its kind. A poor camera-box and a weak lens will not give good results. Have the dark room and everything in it in perfect order. Use great care in every part of the process. Carelessness never succeeds. Do not be satisfied with any kind of an impression because some ignorant person has told you you are doing splendidly."

New Use for the Papaw

In the West Indies, one of the characteristics of an intelligent cook is the care with which he or she will see to it that a papaw tree is growing within a short distance of the kitchen door. The fruit of the papaw, if large and well grown, is not to be despised as a breakfast dish, and its rich golden flesh is to many much more palatable than that of the popular melon.

Wire Finer Than Hair.

The wire used in making the receiving instruments of ocean cables, the galvanometers used in testing cables and measuring the insulation of covered wires, and other delicate instruments, is possessed of remarkable fineness. Some of this wire is 1-3000th of an inch in diameter, finer than the hair of the human head.

Writing on Metals.

To write inscriptions on metals, says the Manufacturers Gazette, take four ounces of nitric acid and one ounce of muriatic acid, mix and shake well together, and it is ready for use. Then cover your metal surface to be engraved with beeswax or soap, with your inscription plainly in the wax.

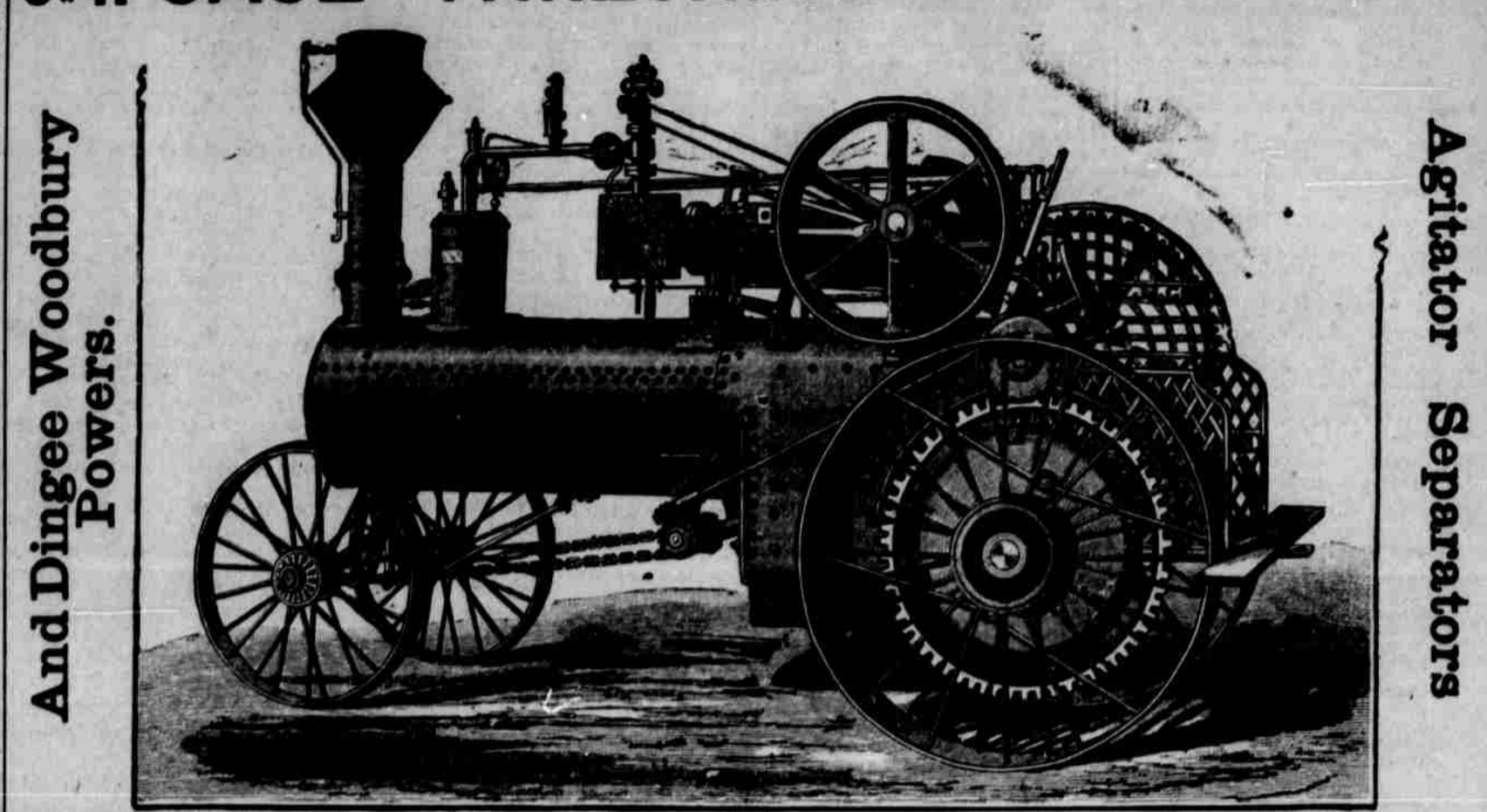
