A Plot to Break from Prison.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7 .- A daring plot to break from state prison at San Quentin has been frustrated and seven leaders, who are among the most desper-ate among the 1,300 convicts, have been placed in solitary cells. It was the in-tention to fell the guard with a slung shot as he passed the cell of one of the leaders. With his keys all the other convicts would be released, the guards in the yards overpowered and the es-cape made. The plot was detected by a guard overhearing certain words that routed his suspicion. The men were watched and gradually the names of the leaders learned. When the crisis was thought to be at hand, the leaders were arrested and lodged in the solitary ouls, where they are being closely guarded. Quentin has been frustrated and seven
