

BAD BANK CLERKS.

Two Arrested for Falsifying Keystone Bank Accounts.

PRISON PLOT FRUSTRATED.

Desperate Fight Between Kentucky Convicts—Escaped Prisoners Bagged—Three of the Poplar Bluff Gang Retaken.

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 7.—Charles R. Ego and E. Maguire, formerly individual ledger clerks at the Keystone bank, were arrested charged with making false entries in the ledgers and making such statements as would tend to deceive the bank examiner.

Desperate Fight Between Convicts. FRANKFORT, Ky., Sept. 7.—Two convicts in the penitentiary made a deadly assault upon each other and a third attempted to separate them.

A Plot to Break from Prison. SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 7.—A daring plot to break from state prison at San Quentin has been frustrated and seven leaders, who are among the most desperate among the 1,300 convicts, have been placed in solitary cells.

Escaped Prisoners Bagged. POPLAR BLUFF, Mo., Sept. 7.—Sheriff Samuel Gardner and a posse of five men, armed with Winchester rifles, came marching into town with three of the prisoners who escaped from the county jail.

France and Russia. PARIS, Sept. 7.—It is asserted that the czar has determined to visit Cherbourg in his yacht and that he will probably extend his tour to Paris.

Austria's Reply. PARIS, Sept. 7.—A correspondent of The Figaro says that Austria will reply to the Turco-Russian convention by annexing Bosnia.

Seacoast Towns Flooded. ASBURY PARK, N. J., Sept. 7.—The severe rains of the past two days and the unusually heavy surf caused much damage along the New Jersey seacoast towns.

Bulling's Spiritual Adviser Released. SAKANNAH, Mo., Sept. 7.—The Rev. August Lavake, who acted as spiritual adviser at the hanging of Louis Bulling, has been released in bonds of \$500 to answer the charge of furnishing Bulling the weapon with which the murderer attempted suicide before his execution.

Disappointed in Love. LINCOLN, Neb., Sept. 7.—Fred A. Eichler of Chicago died in his bed. The indications are that the young man was dependent over a love affair and committed suicide by taking morphine.

Killed the Girl He Wanted to Marry. HELENA, MONT., Sept. 7.—Charles Snyder of Miles City fatally cut Lily Dunkley with a large knife because she refused to marry him.

Municipal Electric Lighting.

EDITOR ALLIANCE: About every so often some one bobs up serenely and gives the Electric Light company a roasting to which someone who is ashamed to sign his name answers, who seems to be well pleased with the present status of affairs.

Not being satisfied with this contract (which was open robbery), these same gentlemen go on and modify the original contract so as to pay the company about 25 per cent more for their services than in the first one and double that which was necessary in either case.

First as to the extra 25 per cent: The first contract was at the rate of \$10 per month for midnight lights and \$15 for all night lights, or \$120 per year, and \$180 respectively.

The following figures I have over the signatures of the mayor of each city mentioned and there are others which we will not ask space to present:

Here we have the record of nine cities showing the cost to average \$64.38 per year per light.

To put in a plant here of 200 light capacity it would cost the city about \$30,000.

Now suppose we say it will cost \$75,000 per year to run our lights all dark hours, which is more than it is costing any other city where they have municipal lighting.

Very well, we will hold on to our plant just five years more, and we will own it ourselves.

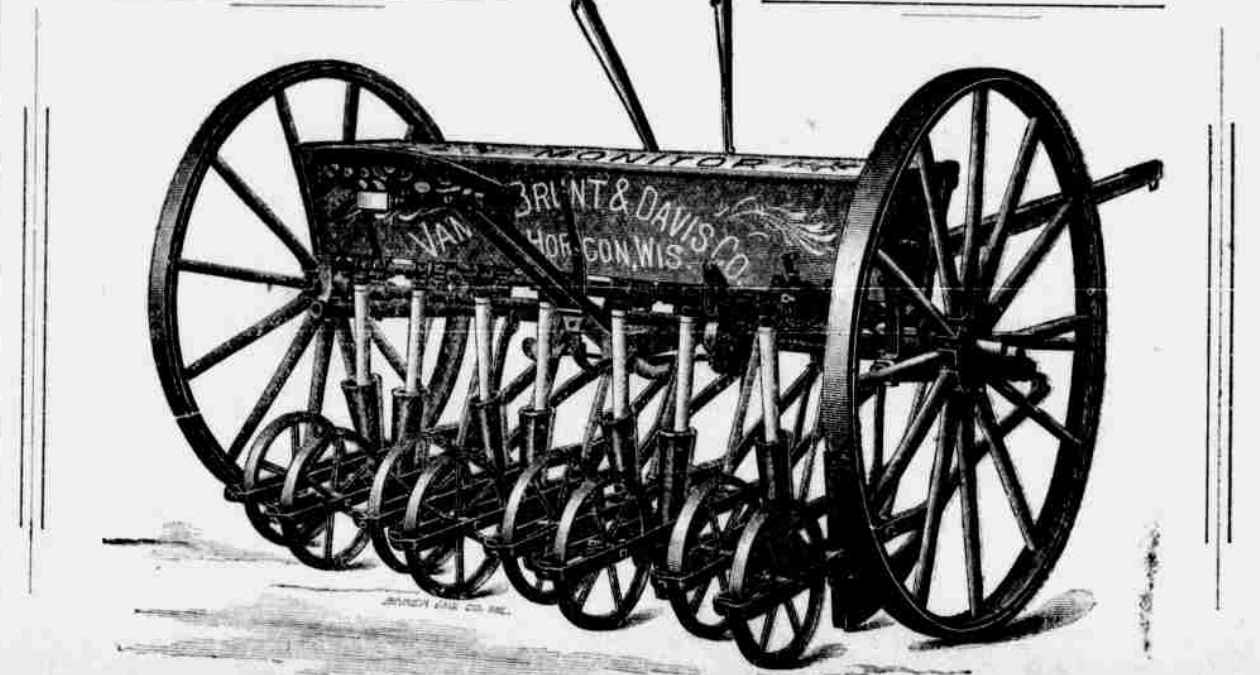
