August 8, 1892. How sail and deplorable the fact that some men are so shallow and devoid of any power to retain what is said that you must be continually explaining to them-and still they don't know.


Sometof our good rattle brain republicans are saying,- 'How can you stand Fields, that cld "ebel? Could you vote for such a man? [ will die first."
