### MEETING THE SANTA PR.

Chairman Caldwell Fixes Basis for Com-

petition by Western Roads. CHICAGO, July 29. - Chairman Caldwell furnished the western roads with his decision in relation to their application for leave to meet the Santa Fe's \$13 rate. He granted the authority sought under the following regulations: The rate is to apply through the Chicago, Peoria and St. Louis gateways in all the territory south of the Hill (Cen-tral's lines to Dubuque. South of the the Chicago Great Western lines from Dubuque to Waterloo, and south of the Illinois Central lines again from Waterloo to Sioux City. Selling dates of tickets to be Aug. 3 to 7, tickets to be good for continuous passage only from date of sale. The original arrangements contemplated a five-days transit limit in both directions, but under the new order this has been changed. The final limit of the tickets is to be Oct. 11, but they may be certified to for the return trip at Denver, Colorado Springs or Pueblo. The roads are also authorized to sell one-way tickets at the \$12 rate to Denver and all intermediate points on the dates named for the sale of the round-trip tickets. These rates and arrangements will be tendered connecting roads for basing purposes.

CONGRESSIONAL

### Senate

WASHINGTON, July 29. - Notwithstand ing the heat and the ascertained departure for the summer of nearly forty senators, which left barely a voting quorum on hand, the senate declined to take any decided action either on the anti-option bill or the house resolution to adjourn on Saturday next. The motion to lay the sati-option bill aside till December was lost by the unexpectedly large vote of 13 to 32. An almost equally frigid reception was given to the adjournment resolution. Considerable miscellaneous legislation, by unanimous consent, was accomplished in a helter skelter way between times, including the passage of an eight-hour labor law, to apply to all contracts on government works, which now goes to the president for approval.

House, Dilatory tactics on the fair appropriation were pursued until 4 calock, when the house adjourned. It is impossible to predict the length of the deadlock. The opponents of the appropriation have made overtures for a compromise. One proposition is that if a loan will be accepted it will be voted speedily and the house can then adjourn; another is to the effect that if the advocates of the appropriation will yield to a direct vote be assure day in December. Those in favor of the appropriation naturally refuse any offers of a compromise and believe that they have the battle won It now ap pears to be simply a question of physical endurance.

# Amnesty in Chill.

VALPARAISO, July 29.—The Chilean senate favors the passage of a general amnesty bill, but there is much opposieral Baquedano, to whom Balmaceda surrendered Santiago, who is a senator, is one of the strongest advocates of the bill. General Pelasquez still remains on board the warship Pilcomeyo, pending a judicial trial.

Copper Mines Suspend.

HOUGHTON, July 29.—The Perinsula: Copper Mining company will close down in about one month on account of the low price on copper. It is thought that other mines, which have in years past paid dividends, must close or call for assessments.

# Two Drowned.

KINGSTON, Ont., July 39. The twomasted schooner Kate was capsized in the Bay of Quinte, near Kingston. James Salmon, sailor, and Mrs. Pappa, cook, were drowned. Others of the crew were saved by the steamer Hero.

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
