The company furnishes each hotel with are unbestrationly to be obeyed. a next rack, either stationary or revolving, and supports a delivery wagon and an agent, whose duty it is to make the rounds weekly, putting new time tables in place and replenishing the depleted

As a consequence it is a far easier and information in New York regarding the movements of western and southern trains than it ever was before, and every one who has waited for an hour or more at a lonesome railway station or has lost a half day through misinformation will bless the genius who invented a railway time table supply company. - New York Herald.

A person shall not be permitted to this order who does not possess a good moral character, or who is in any way incapacitated from carning a livilbood, nor shall he be under sixteen years of age.
