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COUNTY COURT RULES.

By virtue of an order of sale issued out of the District Court of Douglas County, Nebraska, and to be directed, I will on the 20th day of March, A. D. 1903, at 10 o'clock a. m. of said day, at the EAST front door of the County Court House, in the City of Omaha, Douglas County, Nebraska, sell at public auction the property described in said order of sale as follows, to-wit:

1st. All cases not answered to the summons or parties at the call, will stand continued by agreement of parties.

2nd. In all cases which are not to be tried, I will direct the parties to appear at the call docketed in order to prepare for trial, and to show the length of time it will take to try the case.

3rd. Cases in which issues are not joined will stand for trial, unless for special reasons it is ordered otherwise.

4th. All cases will be set for hearing within the term, unless for special reasons it is otherwise ordered.

5th. All cases will be set for trial in the order in which they appear on the call docket, unless the parties agree upon a time when the case is to be tried, or for special reasons the court shall order otherwise. Default cases will be set for the morning hour.

6th. The business case will continue at 9:00 a. m.

7th. The morning hour will be from 9:00 a. m. to 10:00 a. m.

8th. The morning hour will be devoted to (1st.) motions, demurrers, and default cases set for that day; (2nd.) to motions, demurrers, and default cases which have previously passed on their regular day and transferred on the calendar to this day.

9th. After a case, a motion or a demurrer has passed the time for which it is set, it cannot be called up until a motion is filed and docketed by leave of the court, and such notice to the opposite party as the court may order at the time leave is given to file the motion.

10th. Business set for a certain time, cannot be transferred to another day or hour, unless the transfer order is made at the hour the matter is set for hearing, except under Rule 10.

11th. Each day at 9:00 a. m., the business of the hour will be called.

12th. The matters will be heard in the order in which they are entered on the calendar unless all parties present and interested consent to another arrangement, or in case of urgent necessity.

TRIAL OF CASES TO-DAY. The trial of cases will commence at 10:00 o'clock a. m., and continue until 5:30 o'clock p. m., recess from 12:30 p. m. until 1:30 p. m. Each case is entitled to be called at the time set or within ten minutes thereafter; either to be proceeded with or to be adjourned to a later date. For this purpose no party will be required to wait longer than ten minutes for the opposite party or other business, except for urgent reasons. The trial of a case will be suspended at any time for this purpose. In case the court finds that any rule herein will work an unforeseen hardship, the court reserves the right to suspend the rule for the special case.
