HOLY POPES.

Rev. Peter De Clark, D. D., Contributes a Few Pages of History.

A Woman Pope and a Bath of Blood Are Two Things Romanists Find It Hard to Get Away From.

In the closing part of the latest authentic creed of the Roman Catholic church are these words:

"I acknowledge the holy Catholic Apostolic, Roman church for the mother and mistress of all churches, and I promise true obedience to the bishop of Rome, successor of St. Peter, prince of the apostles, and vicar of Jesus Christ. * * * I do at this present freely profess and sincerely hold this true Catholic faith. * * The doctrine of pontificial infallibility

is added as a part of the creed; to which every Catholic subscribes or makes acknowledgment.

"Seventy-nine out of the 259 that sat on the chair of St. Peter are invoked upon our altars as saints eminent for holiness." Their infallibility is championed by him.

Let us look at a few of these popes said to be infallible in faith and morals, to whom Catholics promise "true obedience," some of | hom are invoked on Catholic altars "as saints eminent for holiness."

A. D. 400, when the title "Catholie" was fully settled upon the church of Rome by the bloody wars of Theodoclous, Anastasius was its bishop. He was succeeded by his son, Innocent I., in the year 40t or 402. Innocent demanded that all questions of faith and morals should be submitted to him for settlement; yet he permitted a notable case of pologamy and incest to go unrebuked, and issued an edict, during the Gothle seige of Rome in 408, restoring the worship of the old Roman gods. This same Innocent I. is worshiped as a saint!

Zosimus, his successor, while pope, was the leader of the Pelagian heresy. He, too, is called "a saint." Celestine I., another saint, pope from 423 to 432, was a violent opposer and persecutor of the Pelagians.

Pope Marcellinus I., another saint, who filled the chair from June 30, 296 for eight years, is said by Powell, on the authority of Howard, a Catholic writer, to have "sacrificed to devils," of which fact he was accused—so says "tradition," the great Catholic authority-by three priests and two deacons, before a council of 300 bishops, in the year 303. Having confessed the same, he was allowed to condemn himself! Which thing, of course, he never

The traditions connected with the pontificial career of Sylvester L-his leprosy and proposed bath of human blood-do not place him in the most enviable light. Yet these, probably, are purely fictitious. I should hesitate to accept these traditions as true. Nevertheless, the creed reads: "I most steadfastly admit and embrace the apostolic and ecclesiastical traditions,"

Eugenius I., (655-656), is called by Gibbon "a pagan." The clergy charged him with rebellion and apostacy; because that "by his permission the altar of Victory was again restored, and that the idolatrous symbols of Jupiter and Hercules were displayed in the field, against the inevitable standard of the cross."
